Academic Policies

It is the responsibility of the graduate student to become familiar with and observe all policies and requirements of the School for Interdisciplinary and Graduate Studies, of the College of Arts and Sciences and of his or her particular degree program and department. Policies, procedures, and requirements are subject to change. It is the responsibility of graduate students to be aware of current regulations. All students must respond to official notices issued by administrative offices and instructors, whether these notices are posted on official bulletin boards, are sent by e-mail or snail mail (U.S. Postal Service).

All graduate students are expected to make steady and satisfactory progress toward the completion of degrees. Students who fail to enroll for a period of more than 12 months will be considered to have withdrawn from the program. Students who seek to return after such a period of time are required to apply to their departments for readmission. Based on the request of the department, the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences will consider the student for readmission.

Prior to reapplying, students should speak with their department. Students may submit a reenrollment form to the Office of the Registrar if it has been less than two years since their last enrollment.

Graduate Student Association

The Graduate Student Association (GSA), governed by the Graduate Student Council (GSC), is a member of the Student Government Association (SGA). The GSA provides official channels for the administration of graduate student affairs and the budget allotted by the SGA. Through its council meetings, the GSA provides:

- A forum for communication between graduate student populations.
- The opportunity to participate in the formation and revisions of budgetary and administrative policies.
- Open communication with the Officers of the GSC who represent the GSA at SGA Student Senate Meetings.
- A means to educate graduate students of their rights, responsibilities and privileges.
- A reservoir of interested students for appointment to University committees.

The Graduate Student Council's (GSC) goal is to address issues that are important to graduate students at the University of Louisville — issues like travel stipend increases, research assistance programs and making sure that graduate students are appropriately represented in all areas of the university. There are issues that concern graduate students in all departments that may be addressed by the GSC. Graduate Teaching

If you are a graduate teaching assistant (GTA), you have a distinct set of responsibilities. You should have a faculty member in your department supervising your teaching. You should be very familiar with the Student Bill of Rights and with the Faculty Code of Responsibilities; both found in the graduate catalog (INSERT WWW LINK).

All new international graduate teaching assistants, with the exception of those who teach a foreign language, must demonstrate their level of proficiency in English before they may begin their teaching. Information about the times and places for the examination may be obtained in the Department of English (http://louisville.edu/a-s/iesl/GTA/FAQs.htm).

You should remember that the job of teacher is one of great responsibility--you must convey information, knowledge, and serve as a role model for your students. To that end, it is important that you remain impartial, that you observe the rules of confidentiality, that you are sensitive to the needs and demands of your students, and that you avoid any hint of sexual harassment. This seems like a long list, but it is very manageable and should become almost second nature in time.

Know that UofL has firm policies relating to sexual harassment. As a graduate teaching assistant, you should neither be a victim nor a perpetrator of any form of harassment. Parental, Family, Medical Leave

Effective in 2010, SIGS and A&S have instituted a new set of policies regarding leave for graduate students who receive financial support from the University. Please review the policies below in the event of any parental, family, or medical situations which may require leave from full-time duties.

Policy 1: Petition for Part-time Enrollment Status — Graduate students must be enrolled full-time to receive stipend awards, but a graduate student who faces extenuating circumstances (a serious health condition, an issue with care of a family member, etc.) may petition to enroll in part-time status and continue to receive the full stipend award, for one semester only, for a situation that does not require a full leave of absence. The department or program may require the student to continue the service obligations that are linked to the stipend award while in part-time enrollment status. The student must be able to document the need for this request.

Policy 2: Parental Leave — Any student who receives a scholarship from SIGS is eligible for leave from their academic responsibilities for a period of 3 weeks in connection with the birth or adoption of a child. Either parent is eligible for parental leave. The student will be allowed to retain the stipend, tuition and other benefits during the leave period as well as remain in full-time enrollment status. It is the student's responsibility to work with their instructors, mentor, and the Director of Graduate Studies to make arrangements to accommodate for missed lectures and service duties during the leave period.

Parental Leave Award Program — SIGS will provide one-half of a graduate student stipend for 3 weeks. The Department and/or A&S will also provide one-half of a stipend for 3 weeks.

Goals: Provide a stipend supplement to cover service obligations of a

graduate student who is on parental leave

Eligibility: Departments that have granted parental leave to a funded

graduate student

Nominator: Department Chair

Application Date: Applications will be accepted anytime

Maximum Award: 3 weeks stipend support, pro-rated by the department's

standard G-12 stipend.

ULink-UofL Online

This is the main university *portal*. It is the main functional page for ALL programs, operations, functions, etc. of the university. Through ULink, you will be able to register for your classes, check your financial aid, obtain your grades and use many other personalized features. You can get technical help and learn about free software and services available to you as a student. It is also an entry point for all programs at the university including Groupwise and BlackBoard.

Go to: https://ulink.louisville.edu/, to **ULink**, the university portal.

- 1. Under the "Log In" section, select the link For First-time Users
- 2. Follow the 2 steps for locating your userID and then use the formula for calculating your password for the first login.
- 3. Once you have logged in, you will be prompted to change your password.
- 4. This new password will be of your own choosing; the university does not keep record of it. You want your password to include at least one number (0-9) and one uppercase character.
- 5. You may need to wait 10 minutes before you can use this new password.
- Your userID and this password will now work for ULink, Groupwise and Blackboard.
- Every student at the university is assigned an email account in Groupwise.
 Groupwise is where you will receive important information from the university or from your professors. Please become familiar with how to view mail, send mail and add attachments as well as all the other features of this email program.
- BlackBoard is the university's online classroom system. Your class may
 be fully online or web-enhanced, using BlackBoard as only one component
 of the course. BlackBoard has features such as course documents, units,
 lessons, assignments, video and audio features, chat sessions and
 discussion boards as well as assessments and tests.

- Type your user ID and password, which will take you to your BlackBoard front page. Here you will see a list of all the courses you are taking or have for this and the last semester.
- ALL courses have a BlackBoard link whether they are delivered online or face to face.
- 3. Locate the course you want to enter and click on it.
- Spend some time learning to navigate thru the course and become familiar with the set up and other features. Not all online courses are set up alike.

TARC

Your Cardinal Card is even more valuable! With a current UofL I.D. you can ride anytime, anywhere on the Transit Authority of River City (TARC) for FREE

TARC has more than 50 routes that travel through Louisville and Southern Indiana. Individual route schedules and maps are available in the SAC, the lobby of the Houchens building and in Ekstrom library. You can also go online at http://www.ridetarc.org or call customer service at 502-585-1234.

TARC buses only stop at TARC bus stops. These are clearly marked by red signs along every route. Destination signs above the front bus window display the route number, the route name and the destination of the bus.

All **TARC** buses are bike rack-equipped and will carry most bicycles. This is a great way to get around the entire Louisville area, and it takes less than 10 seconds to load your bike on the rack. Each rack can carry two bikes and space is first come, first served.

Department of Public Safety

Many resources are available to the students at the University of Louisville.

- The University offers an extensive library system designed to support undergraduate and graduate teaching, learning and research. The Library system consists of Ekstrom (the Main Library), the Fine Arts Library, the Law Library, the Music Library, the Health Sciences Library, and the University Archives and Records Center. - Louisville Zoo: The Louisville Zoo has more than 1,300 animals from all over the world, exhibited in beautiful natural settings. Enjoy the interactive Lorikeet Landing and the award-winning Gorilla Forest featuring 11 gorillas. The zoo is open year-round.
- Churchill Downs: Recently renovated, the racetrack is most famous for the oldest continuously run sporting event in the United States the Kentucky Derby. Known as the "Run for the Roses" or "the greatest two minutes in sports," the Derby is the first leg of the Triple Crown of Thoroughbred horse racing and is the biggest event on the Louisville calendar. The Derby is preceded by two weeks of festivities kicked off by Thunder Over Louisville, the largest and longest fireworks display in the nation. Open year round, the Kentucky Derby Museum offers exhibits and tours of the grounds.
- Muhammad Ali Center: The Muhammad Ali Center serves as both a destination site and a international education and cultural center that is inspired by the ideals of its founder Muhammad Ali.

Louisville is also the location of many museums and theaters, including the Speed Museum of Art, the Louisville Slugger Museum, the Frazier International History Museum, the Louisville Science Center, Actor's Theater of Louisville, and the Kentucky Center for Performing Arts. Metro government operates 122 city parks within Louisville and the surrounding area. There is no lack of things to do in Louisville. Visit http://www.gotolouisville.com/ for the calendar of events.

How to Dress in Louisville

Although Louisville experiences four distinct seasons, summer tends to come early, fall lasts easily into December, and the relatively short winters bring more rain than snow. March is usually the wettest month, October the driest.

Spring can have warm days but cool nights can linger. To stay warm, long-sleeved shirts or light sweaters are suggested. An umbrella will come in handy.

Summer can be very hot and humid. Bright, light-weight clothing is a must.

Fall, like spring, can have fluctuating temperatures between day and night, so have sweaters or light jackets ready.

Layering is the key to the winter months. Long sleeves, sweaters, medium to heavy coats, hat and gloves should be included in your wardrobe.

Assignments for new residents are made on a first-come, first-served basis. The Confirmation and License Forms for new applicants are mailed beginning the third week of February for the Fall Semester and the first week of December for the Spring Semester. For television cable service, contact *Insight Communication* at 502-357-4400. Insight Communication also offers telephone service and high-speed internet which you can bundle together with cable service for a nominal discount.

What if I get sick?

UofL students can use the Student Health Center, located between the SAC and the Houchens building. It is assumed that all students have health insurance. What's the story with transportation?

The public bus transportation in Louisville is provided by TARC. At UofL, there is a shuttle service that links the Belknap campus to the main student parking lots, located at Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. Louisville International Airport (SDF) is located 3 miles south of the Belknap Campus. Taxi service to all points in the Louisville area is available, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week through Yellow Cab at 502-636-5511

Where can I park?

Campus parking is limited; students are generally encouraged to park in Green Lots, particularly those near Papa John's Cardinal Stadium. Students who reside on campus are eligible for Yellow Permits. After 7:30 pm and on week-

ends, you can park on campus without a permit in all areas except in handicap spaces or yellow lots. For more information on parking and detailed parking maps, visit http://www.louisville/edu/admin/dps.

How do I get a carrel in the Library?

Open carrels are located in the Art Library, Ekstrom Library, the Law Library and the Music Library.

Enclosed carrels are located in Ekstrom Library and are for the use of PhD and Masters candidates. Contact the Library Administration Office at 502-852-6745, to request an enclosed carrel.

Where can I get food on campus?

There are numerous restaurants in the SAC for your convenience. Damon's Grill features grilled steaks, chicken, seafood, salads, and award-winning ribs. McAlister's Deli, located in the Miller ITC, offers fresh deli sandwiches and soup. On the ground floor of Ekstrom Library, food and local Heine Brothers coffee are available at the Tulip Tree Cafe. Where can I buy groceries?

The bookstore in the SAC has a limited supply of food items. There is a Save-A-Step market across from campus on Third Street. There is a large Kroger supermarket at the corner of Third and Central Avenue. Louisville is also home to a number of farmer's markets and ethnic food stores.

Where can I buy international or specialty foods?

ValuMarket carries an eclectic selection of international, specialty, and hard to find food items. The nearest location to campus is located in the Mid-City Mall complex at 1250 Bardstown Rd. Lotsa Pasta International Food Shop (3717 Lexington Rd) and Whole Foods Market (4944 Shelbyville Road) also carry a wide selection.

Where can I cash a check?

Students can cash checks up to the amount of \$25 at the Bursar's office.

Where's the nearest bank?

There is a bank on campus in the SAC. The university also houses a branch of Kentucky Telco, a credit union, whose office is in the Parking Structure on Floyd Street. There are other banks nearby, notably a branch of PNC Bank at Third and Cardinal.

Where can I exchange foreign currency?

If you need to exchange currency, Fifth Third Bank's branch office inside the airport is open Monday-Friday, 8:00-6:00, Saturday 9:00-1:00, and Sunday 11:00-4:00. You can also exchange currency at Chase Bank at 4th and Jefferson street in downtown Louisville on Monday-Friday, 8:00-5:00.

What about Postal Services?

A stamp vending machine is available in the lobby of the Student Activities Center. There is also a Postal Service Center located at the north entrance of the Houchens building (facing Student Health and the SAC). Mailboxes are available for students who reside in University housing where no mail delivery is available. Students may obtain a mailbox at the University Postal Service as long as they reside in University housing and can provide a current housing agreement contract. Where can I find school/office supplies?

The bookstore in the SAC has a limited supply of paper, folders, and general office supplies. The nearest office supply store to campus is Staples at 5607 Preston Highway.

Where can I make copies and prepare professional documents?

The University of Louisville Printing Services is located in Miller ITC can help you produce black and white and color copies, research posters, classroom materials, annual reports, brochures, stationery and business cards. The nearest FedEx Office (formerly Kinko's) is located at the corner of Third and Central Avenue. The nearest 24 hour FedEx Office is located on 1235 S Hurstbourne Pkwy (near I-64).

Where can I find a shopping mall?

The two malls near to campus are the adjoining Oxmoor Center and Mall St. Matthews on Shelbyville Road and the Watterson Expressway. The two feature over 150 different shops and restaurants. Where can I see a movie?

The Floyd Theatre (3rd Floor of the SAC) hosts weekly movies, including sneak previews of upcoming theatrical releases. Movies are scheduled Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday evening (when classes are in session), with showings at 6:00pm and 8:30pm. For more information about Floyd Theater, please contact the Student Activities Office at 852-6691. The closest cinema to campus is the Baxter Ave Filmworks located at Mid-City Mall (1250 Bardstown Rd.) and offers mainly first-run films. Village 8 (4014 Dutchmans Lane), is Louisville's only discount theater and shows new "Louisville Exclusive" independent, foreign, and art-house films. What about volunteering?

Where can I find out what's going on in Louisville?

The best place to find out what is going on in the Louisville area is online at http://www.gotolouisville.com/. You can also pick up Louisville's Eccentric Observer, The LEO, and Velocity for free at establishments all over town. The LEO and Velocity are local "what's happening" magazines. The Courier-Journal is the local daily newspaper and will list any events currently going on around town. The newsstand price is 75¢ during the week and \$1.75 for the Sunday paper—a subscription is \$19.95 per month. The local television stations are WAVE (NBC), WHAS (ABC), WLKY (CBS), WDRB (Fox). Louisville is home to two public broadcasting channels, WKMJ (PBS) and WKPC (PBS) and three public radio stations: WUOL 90.5 (classical), WFPL 89.3 (news and information), WFPK 91.9 (jazz and eclectic music).

Night Life @ Louisville

After a long day of school-related activities, there is nothing better than to sit back and relax in the evening or weekends with friends or classmates. The members of the A&S Graduate Student Union suggest the following locations to kick back, enjoy a beverage, and see some places that are uniquely Louisville:

The Granville Inn (3rd and Gaulbert)

One of the nearest bars to campus, The Granville is frequented by U of L students and neighborhood regulars alike. Their burgers are often voted among the best in Louisville and reasonable food and drink prices fit well in a graduate student's budget.

The Magnolia Bar and Grill (2nd and Magnolia)

The "grill" portion is a bit of misnomer as they do not serve food, but the "Mag Bar" is Old Louisville's hipster hangout. There is live music on most nights and a great jukebox for other times. Add cheap drinks and it is simply a dive bar.

Zanzabar (Preston and Lynn)

Another near campus bar, Zanzabar is one of the best venues for local music in Louisville. If you are not into music, there is trivia on Sunday nights or sit out on the back patio to enjoy the evening. They offer a full menu and a surprisingly good beer list ranging from cheap domestics to local microbrews.

Nachbar (Charles and Krieger in Germantown)

Aptly translated, this neighborhood bar in Germantown features a wide selection of beers, both on draft and bottled, from across the globe. Each fall and spring Nachbar takes part in the Schnitzelburg Walk, which could be best described as part block party, part community festival.

O'Shea's Irish Pub (Baxter near Highland in the Highlands)

While more of a bar than a traditional Irish pub, O'Shea's (and its neighboring bar Flannigan's) has one of the best outdoor seating arrangements in Louisville. They have an exhaustive beer selection including an "Around the World" club for those who complete all 77 beers on the list. O'Shea's is a bit pricey, as this bar caters to the "be seen" crowd on weekends. Make sure to try one of the nearby late night pizza joints (Wick's, Spinelli's, or Papalino's) to find your favorite Louisville pizza.

Lynn's Paradise Café (Barret near Hepburn in the Highlands)

Imagine a Cracker Barrel for those in their 20's and 30's and you have Lynn's. A popular brunch restaurant, Lynn's is known for its dynamite breakfast menu yet has a full bar for those morning mimosas. While waiting for your table, be sure to check out the gift shop for items ranging from kitschy to bizarre.

Fourth Street Live (4th and Liberty in Downtown)

Renovated from the former Galleria shopping mall, Fourth Street Live is worth the mention due to its variety of bars and restaurants all in one site. The facility hosts a series of free concerts in the spring and summer months while the Improv Comedy Club attracts national touring comedians all year long. Be warned that Fourth Street tends to attract a more undergraduate crowd.
