Terson de Paleville's Team to Present Research

Daniella Terson de Paleville, Assistant Professor in the Department of Health and Sport Sciences, and Jason Immekus, Associate Professor in the Department of Educational Leadership, Evaluation and Organizational Development, work with a team of UofL students, four undergraduates and four graduates, at Hawthorne Elementary, a Spanish Immersion school. The goal of this ongoing project is to explain the link between physical activity, academic skills and classroom behavior in children 5 - 10 years old. Two of the undergraduate and graduate students on the team will present their work in poster presentations during UofL's Neuroscience Day and the **Undergraduate Research Symposium** that will be held in April.
