- A qualitative data analysis computer software package produced by QSR International.
- It is designed to help organize, analyze and find insights in unstructured or qualitative data including: interviews, open-ended survey responses, articles, social media, and web content.
- It is intended to help researchers organize and analyze non-numerical or unstructured data.
