BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Our bachelor's degree will prepare you for a career in the criminal justice system or enrollment in a graduate program. Throughout the program, you'll be actively engaged in the learning process as you gain theoretical knowledge and applied skills.

The following core competencies are extended across the curriculum and emphasized to a different degree in each course.

- A working knowledge of the entire criminal justice process (adult and juvenile) and the issues surrounding each portion of the process.
- Ability to make linkage between theory and policy development in the criminal justice system.
- Ability to understand, identify, and apply legal issues relative to the criminal justice system.



Program Information:

- Credits needed to Graduate: 121 minimum
- Accreditation: The program is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS)
- Bachelor of Science in the Administration of Justice Program can be completed on-campus or completely online.
- Online students complete their first two years of general education requirements online through Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) then transfer to the University of Louisville to take the core and elective courses.
- Online program: Degree/Credential Award: KCTCS Associate in Applied Science in Criminal Justice and University of Louisville Bachelor of Science in the Administration of Justice.

MASTER OF SCIENCE IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE

Graduate studies in the Department of Justice Administration provides students with advanced social and behavioral science skills as well as a detailed and thorough understanding of crime, criminal justice and related processes. Graduates of this program are prepared to continue advanced studies in criminal justice or other social sciences and to assume mid and upper-level leadership positions within criminal justice programs and agencies.

The interdisciplinary nature of the program maintains the dynamic posture that allowed this crime related discipline to emerge and to mature quickly and successfully. Graduate students are given latitude in choosing elective courses in the Master of Science in the Administration of Justice program. Elective courses related to the student's program of study are selected from the resources of the entire University. Courses in social work, public administration, law, business, and various departments of the College of Arts and Sciences are possible electives that the student and his or her advisor may consider. With proper selection, the electives can complement the core criminal justice courses and produce a balanced, interdisciplinary program which is tailored to meet specific professional and career goals.



Program Information:

- 36 hour curriculum.
- Students may transfer in 6 graduate credit hours from other accredited universities.
- Students may be admitted provisionally pending receipt of all application materials.
- Classes offered on-campus or year round online
- Online degree may be completed in three intensive enrollment semesters.
- Professional student advisers available to assist in degree planning
- Graduates of the Southern Police Institute's Administrative Officers Course, graduate track have completed 12 hours (one third) of this graduate degree and may waive the GRE.

Admission Requirements:

In addition to completing the application for admission and paying the non-refundable application fee, applicants must provide:

- Evidence of a bachelor's degree and 3.0 cumulative grade point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale.
- Official transcripts of all undergraduate and graduate work
- General test score on the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) verbal and quantitative combined of 900 (former test) or 282 (new test)

- Two recommendation forms
- Personal statement (300-500 words) including a brief autobiographical sketch and an outline of your goals and aspirations

Online Flexible Format:

Our convenient block-format allows you to take only one class every 6-week term, giving you more time to focus on class material, as well as the flexibility to spend time with family and pursue your career. You may earn your Master of Science in the Administration of Justice in as little as two years, taking 100% of your courses online.

The program requires a minimum of 36 credits for completion: a core of 15 hours, 18 hours of electives and 3 credits for the completion of a professional paper. The core curriculum includes an overview of the criminal justice system, theories of crime and delinquency, legal issues in criminal justice and advanced statistics and research methods. Elective courses cover specialized topics within criminal justice such as capital punishment, violent crime, domestic violence, criminal justice in media, international terrorism, substance abuse and justice policy, and issues in policing and ethics in criminal justice practice.
