David William Foster is Regent's Professor of Spanish and Women and Gender Studies at Arizona State University. His research and teaching focus primarily on urban society in Buenos Aires and São Paulo, with an emphasis on women's history and gender identity. He also researches the culture of Jewish diaspora in Latin America. He has held Fulbright appointments in Argentina, Uruguay, and Brazil, and served as Inter-American Development Bank Professor in Chile. Foster's presentation will focus on the contributions of women photographers in Latin America, with special emphasis on Argentina and Brazil. Historically, these photographers have played a crucial role in the visibility of women as social subjects, but recent work in Argentina, in particular, has emphasized the relationship between women's history and issues of human rights abuse in the context of authoritarian and neofascist tyranny.
