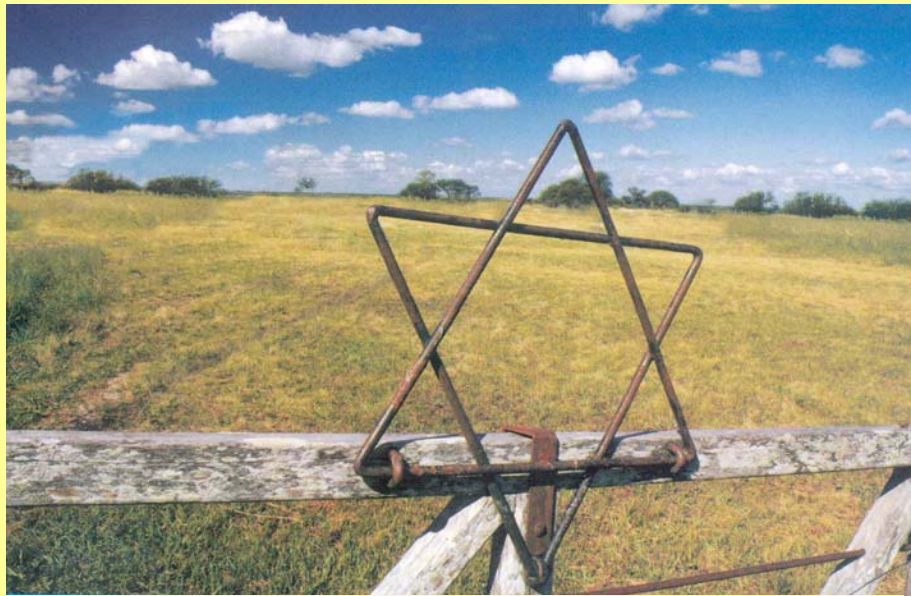

Darrell B. Lockhart is an Associate Professor of Spanish at the University of Nevada, Reno, where he teaches Latin American literature, popular culture, and film, and serves as the Director of the Latino Research Center. He received his Ph.D. from Arizona State University in 1995. His research focuses primarily on Latin American Jewish literature and cultural production, and his publications include: *Latin American Jewish Writers: A Dictionary*, *Culture and Customs of Argentina*, *Latin American Mystery Writers: An A-to-Z Guide*, *Latin American Science Fiction Writers: An A-to-Z Guide*, and numerous articles on Latin American Jewish literature.

Lockhart will incorporate images and film clips in his lecture, which will trace the ever-developing nature of Argentine Jewish culture over the span of approximately the last 100 years, with a primary focus on the representation of Jewish identity in literature, film, and popular culture.
