LALS Celebrates Community Engagement: Author, Wes Moore, Encourages Readers to Make a Difference

On October 18, 2011, LALS co-sponsored the First Year Initiative's lecture, which was presented by Wes Moore, author of The *Other Wes Moore*, the book selected for the 2011 and 2012 UofL Book-in-Common. Christy Metzger, Director of First Year Initiatives and the BinC program, refers to Moore's book as a "call to action to better the community." LALS has taken up that call with a campus campaign to assist Big Brothers Big Sisters of Kentuckiana with their Hispanic Mentoring Initiative. On December 2, 2011, LALS held an Information Session about ways that UofL students may help BBBS with special projects and mentoring of Latino youths.

Our 2011 campaign ends with a BBBS Winter/Holiday Assistance Drive. We are collecting unwrapped hats, mittens, gloves, scarves, and toys for children (7-18 years) in our LALS Office in Stevenson Hall 305 through Tuesday, December 13, 2011.

LALS Honors Community and University of Louisville Leaders at the Kentucky Museum of Art and Craft's 6th Annual Day of the Dead Celebration

More than 2000 people attended the celebration of the Day of the Dead at the Kentucky Museum of Art and Craft, held each year on the first Friday Trolley Hop in November. LALS organized a team of about 40 student volunteers to assist with activities for the children and to serve food and drinks. The crowds viewed the Day of the Dead exhibits and altars, including the 2011 LALS altar, which paid tribute to "The Legacy of Community and University of Louisville Leaders." Months of planning went into the creation of this altar and involved collaborations with faculty, staff and students from several UofL Departments (Classical and Modern Languages, Sociology, and Women's and Gender Studies), the Cultural Center and Porter Scholars, and the Anne Braden Institute for Social Justice Research, as well as

support from our community partners, the Kentucky Museum of Art and Craft and Brown-Forman, and family members, Mrs. Ellie Porter Billops and Mrs. Roberta Hershberg. Four leaders who made outstanding contributions to the community and to the university were honored with individual tributes arranged on an altar that spanned 16 feet. More than 30 people helped to erect the altar to the following individuals: 1) Dr. Lilialyce Akers, Professor of Sociology and Women's and Gender Studies; 2) Mr. Woodford R Porter, Sr., the first African-American president of UofL's Board of Trustees and founder of the Porter Scholarship Society; Anne Braden, a Louisville-born activist, journalist and educator; and 4) Dr. David Hershberg, Professor of Spanish and Italian, Chair of the Department of Classical and Modern Languages, Director of UofL's International Center, and advocate for Louisville's international community.


LALS also assisted the Kosair Children's Hospital with their altar to children who lost their battles with serious illnesses, and helped the UofL Society of Physics Students with their altar to Benjamin Franklin in the Louisville Science Museum. Each year, KMAC erects a Public Altar and invites members of the community to remember their loved ones with photos and personal items. The LALS Program paid homage to Dr. Clarence Talley, Professor of Sociology and a founding member of the LALS Program, by placing his portrait on this Public Altar and also creating a very special altar to him in Ekstrom Library (see page 3).

From September 14-October 2, 2011, audiences on the UofL Belknap campus and Bellarmine University viewed ten feature-length films and six short films by contemporary Guatemalan filmmakers. In addition to watching premiers of these original films and documentaries, the public had the opportunity to meet several of the filmmakers and actors, among them Mario Rosales, director of *El regreso de Lencho*, Julio Hernández director of *Marimbas del infierno*, Chofo Espinosa, director of *Aquí me quedo*, and Domingo Lemus, actor and editor of *Puro Mula*. Many co-sponsors made this film festival possible, including the Department of Classical and Modern Languages, the Office of the Vice Provost for Diversity and International Affairs, the College of Arts and Sciences Office of International, Diversity and Outreach Programs, the Department of Global Languages and Cultures at Bellarmine University, Al Día en América, and Latin American and Latino Studies, among others.


LALS Highlights Panamanian Culture at the 2nd Annual Celebremos Hispanic Heritage Event

What an amazingly powerful way to view the world in which we live, not through policies or law, but through the eyes of the diverse groups of people that make up this great country. Through her photographs of Latina women and their families, Dr. Mari Mujica puts a creative spin on educating and informing others about Latin American women who have immigrated to this country, and thus reveals a story of a subculture of America. The photographs feature short descriptions of reasons why the women immigrated here from several different Latin American countries and the difficulties they have faced. Common among all subjects is their devotion to making a better life for themselves and their families and their struggles to overcome language barriers and prejudice. Through the powerful lens of her camera, Dr. Mujica opens the eyes of people from all backgrounds who view her photos of Latina immigrants. The exhibit opened in the Cultural Center on September 15, 2011 and closed on October 22, 2011, with an engaging reception sponsored by Latin American and Latino Studies.

Dr. David William Foster Presents the 10th Annual LALS Heritage Lecture on Latin American Women Photographers

"Photography is a record of society." This is a line Dr. David William Foster, Regents' Professor of Spanish and Women and Gender Studies at Arizona State University, repeated many times during his lecture on "Founding Latin American Women Photographers," on October 26, 2011, to a packed house in the Elaine Chao Auditorium. He explained that while photographs were a useful source of historical record for many peoples, some social classes were excluded as subjects at different points in time. These neglected groups included the middle class, immigrants, and women. Luckily, a select minority of female photographers made an effort to include them and to record their lives. Dr. Foster spoke about the experiences and works of several women photographers from Argentina and Brazil, including Grete Stern, Annemarie Heinrich, Hildegard Rosenthal, Madalena Schwartz, and Adriana Lestido. If it were not for these artists and their creativity, history and the art of photography would have suffered a great loss. Thanks to Dr. Foster, everyone in attendance at this event learned a great deal about this interesting topic and gained a new perspective on Latin American society and photography. On November 14, 2011, Paulo Rogerio Nunes Dos Santos, a Fulbright Humphrey Fellow and co-founder and executive director of Instituto Mídia Étnica, a leading Afro-Brazilian media NGO in Brazil, presented a lecture on Afro-Brazilians and their current socio-economic, cultural, and political status in Brazil. It was interesting to hear about recent developments involving affirmative action that Brazil has taken in order to overcome the racial divide that plagues the nation. In spite of the fact that Brazil has the second largest black population in the world, the third largest internet market in the world, Afro-Brazilians are under-represented in the media and politics. This was truly an inspiring and eye-opening lecture, and drew attention to the Latin American powerhouse for the future.
