would like to share with our School of Medicine community through this special edition of the Dean's Newsletter.

On Dec. 14, UofL, University Medical Center (UMC) and KentuckyOne Health announced they have agreed to redesign their partnership with a vision to better support the future of health and wellness in Louisville and across Kentucky. UofL and KentuckyOne Health will continue their academic affiliation, including Academic Affiliation Agreements with Jewish Hospital and Frazier Rehab Institute. The Joint Operating Agreement established in 2012 will be revised, placing management of the University of Louisville Hospital and the James Graham Brown Cancer Center under the UMC. This decision was agreed upon by all parties as the

most effective and collaborative way to care for the community. Moving direct operations of the academic medical center to UMC ensures our ability continue innovative and high-quality patient care and clinical training as we care for our patients and educate the next generation of physicians.

I would like to use this opportunity to shine a spotlight on our distinction tracks, which provide medical students the opportunity to explore a specific area in medicine through academic and scholarly activity and to enrich their medical education without prolonging their course of study. A distinction track culminates in a capstone project and is noted on the student's official transcript and MSPE letter for residency application.

In November, I was delighted to present our school's first staff recognition awards. More than 30 staff were nominated for recognition of outstanding service. Our staff is one of our school's greatest assets, and I am pleased to begin a new tradition where we will recognize our staff for their commitment and excellence.

In 2017 a priority will be to provide enhanced communication with our School of Medicine community. We are introducing a new initiative, "Conversations with the Dean," presented as recorded video messages containing updates and information to our school community. In addition, I will host a series of dinners with new and mid-career faculty, directors and division leaders. These new initiatives will create additional opportunities for interface and idea exchanges.

I want to take this opportunity to extend my heartfelt thanks to you for all that you do in supporting the school, and I wish you a joy-filled and safe holiday season. I look forward to ushering in 2017 with a renewed commitment to our mission to create a healthier future for the people of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

The track is directed by Jennifer Brueckner-Collins, Ph.D., Charles Kodner, M.D., and Pradip Patel, M.D.

The original distinction track,

Distinction in Research (DIR) began
in 2010, training students in the role
of clinician as researcher through
methods of basic and translational
research. This track aims to provide
meaningful and productive research
experiences that enrich students'
medical school training. Directed by
Dale Schuschke, Ph.D., and Russ
Prough, Ph.D., DIR accepts students
in their second year of medical
school, following participation in
the Summer Research Scholars
Program.

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PATIENT CARE

Participants in the **Distinction in Business and Leadership** track gain a fundamental knowledge base of the business of medicine. Trainees are instructed in formal business skills that enable them to succeed in the health economy, with its an emphasis on cost savings and improved outcomes. Directed by Brad Sutton, M.D., M.B.A., and In Kim, M.D., M.B.A., the program culminates in a data-driven capstone project.

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COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The Distinction in Global Health track, directed by Bethany Hodge, M.D., M.P.H., and Mary Carter, M.D., Ph.D., is a service-oriented program focused on the needs of the world's poor and combating health inequities across the globe. In 2016, two students in this track, Jessica Eaton and Mackenzie Flynn, received Fulbright-Fogarty Fellowships for separate projects in Africa. This was the first time two awardees were named from the same medical school in one year.


