

Fall is a favorite time of year for me. Although our September heat wave delayed transition to temperatures we typically experience in fall, our academic routines confirm that we indeed are well into the 2019-2020 Fall Semester.

We concluded last year with the commencement of 149 medical students and 61 graduate students in the Class of 2019. We are especially gratified with the match rate of this class of new professionals as they enter residency. UofL had 147 participants in the match with a 95.2 percent initial match rate and a final rate of 96.6 percent, exceeding the national match rate of 95 percent! On July 28, we welcomed 162 new students in the class of 2023!

It is always a pleasure to see former students return and reconnect with UofL. During our Alumni Event in late September,

we were delighted to see members of the Golden Alumni Class of 1969.

Preparation for our next LCME accreditation review is under way. Our LCME Continuous Quality Improvement Committee (CQIC), led by Vice Dean for Undergraduate Medical Education Ann Shaw, M.D., already has reviewed and drafted content for 99 percent of the 12 LCME Standards and 93 Elements in preparation for our April 2021 LCME site visit.

Our clinical enterprise is undergoing dynamic changes thanks to a tremendous effort by President Bendapudi and our team within UofL and UofL Health to finalize an agreement to acquire the Louisville-based KentuckyOne Health assets, including Jewish Hospital and the Frazier Rehab Institute.

We also have entered into a definitive agreement for Norton Healthcare to take responsibility for managing pediatric clinical care. As we work through the transition associated with both transactions, we continue our school's mission to improve the health of the diverse populations we serve through excellence and leadership in education, patient care, research and community engagement.

## EDUCATION

On national board exams, UofL students who first took Step 1 so far in 2019 had a 98 percent pass rate. First-time Step 2 takers in academic 2018-19 had a 99 percent pass rate. Both rates are one percentage point higher than the national rate. On the AAMC Y2Q in 2018, UofL students indicated they strongly agree or agree that UofL is doing a good job of fostering and nurturing their development as future physicians (100 percent) and overall satisfaction with the quality of medical education (98.8 percent).

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## RESEARCH

In a first-of-its-kind study of the effects of plants on human health, the Green Heart Project is beginning planting of approximately 8,000 trees and shrubs in South Louisville neighborhoods. Researchers with UofL's Christina Lee Brown Envirome Institute will compare data about the health of people living in the neighborhoods collected before the plantings with data collected two years after the vegetation is planted.

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## PATIENT CARE

Louisville resident Thomas E. Dunbar has pledged \$1 million to UofL to create a specialized center to provide chimeric antigen receptor positive T (CAR T) cell therapies to patients at the UofL Brown Cancer Center and other centers in Kentucky and the Midwest. This will provide cancer patients throughout the region with access to some of the most advanced immunotherapy treatments available. The new program will be named the Dunbar CAR T-Cell Program.

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## COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

For nearly two decades, the Kentucky Biomedical Research Infrastructure Network (KBRIN), administered at UofL, has been helping scientists at institutions throughout the state get their foot in the door of biomedical research. A five-year, \$18.2 million grant from the National Institutes of Health awarded earlier this year will continue and enhance the work of KBRIN, the state's Institutional Development Award (IDeA).

## Laser vision correction taught to UofL ophthalmology residents

The UofL Department of Ophthalmology and Visual Sciences is one of only a few ophthalmology residency programs to certify residents in laser vision correction. Under the guidance of Richard Eiferman, M.D., and Frank Burns, M.D., residents at UofL are being instructed in laser vision correction as part of their residency training through a partnership with Johnson & Johnson Vision.

To assist these residents in their training, the program is offering more affordable eye surgery to UofL faculty, staff, students and alumni. Resident procedures, staffed by Eiferman, Burns and Mark Cassol, MD, range from \$495 to \$795 per eye for custom LASIK. [LEARN MORE](#).
