- 1. The minutes of October 8, 2004 were approved.
- 2. Gray reported that the Humanities Division is refining an assessment model. Faculty who are teaching general education courses will devise a template of questions for assessing the courses. Faculty members in Humanities have been submitting assessments for a couple of years. This information and other collected data (QMS and various surveys) may be useful may be able to integrate. Billingsley distributed for review a 28-question, general education assessment instrument from AAC&U.

A separate instrument might be needed for the assessment of the General Education Program itself. One question is whether students are able to take courses at a convenient time (sequence issue).

- 3. Schultz discussed the first draft of "solutions" for unmet demand. Individual endorsements included:
 - -- count the 4th or 5th semester of a foreign language as CD (redefine the definition of CD to include upper-level foreign languages) Note: Consult the Curriculum Development Project regarding need and feasibility
 - -- explore the option of testing out of general education courses, based on certain standards such as CLEP and AP
 - *ACTION: Unmet Demands Subcommittee will survey this option and determine extent of "test outs" and any credit awarded
 - -- determine whether there is a perceived problem or real problem in programs (such as Speed, Music, and Nursing) that require prerequisites early on, simultaneously with the general education curriculum
 - -- address the shortage of OC courses at the freshman level (a known shortage)
 - determine how many general education courses are held until the point of Freshman Orientation (enrollment pressures reported by Roselle Taylor)
 *ACTION: Berman to follow up and report to Kolers.

Other comments:

- -- difficult to teach a course that fulfills two content areas (current shortage of faculty to teach at this level)
- -- the capacity issue has not yet been revisited by Boyd, although the MBA teams began a study (Example: 1,000 seats in ENGL 101 reduced to 60 by the beginning of freshman registration)
- -- offering CD courses is a Kentucky Plan and OCR requirement (but not SACS)
- -- general education content courses are less specific at the 100 and 200 levels and can be taught by PTLs (helps address distribution of faculty shortages)
- *ACTION: Turn the discussion into a report and present it to the Deans (make them aware of the problems in conjunction with budget planning).

Note: The GECC can propose, but any changes to the general education learning outcomes/competencies require the endorsement of the unit faculties.

4. The November 5 meeting was canceled to accommodate subcommittee follow-up work. The next full committee meeting was set for November 19.
