Course Objectives:

In Latin 102 the student will continue to learn the principles of Latin grammar and translate Latin texts. Class objectives will be accomplished through a combination of reading, composition, and grammatical analysis. The objectives are as follows:

- 1) to learn fundamentals of Latin grammar;
- 2) to translate elementary Latin texts
- 3) to strengthen English grammar, vocabulary, and composition skills through interaction with the Latin text
