FACULTY SPOTLIGHT: DR. LISA MARKOWITZ

My concern with the inequities in regional and global agrifood systems and popular efforts to transform them has oriented and grounded my work as a cultural anthropologist. For many years I worked with small-holding ranchers in the southern Peruvian Andes, following their efforts to organize and advocate for higher prices for their wool and meat. More recently, I've been looking at the (disappointingly small) role of rural producers in the celebrated Peruvian food scene. My interests in food and farming have also



nourished fieldwork much closer to home: here in Kentucky, I have been engaged in research with and about food justice activists. It's been a real pleasure to get to know many of the people endeavoring to create a healthier and fairer food economy. Currently, I am part of the team building a community owned cooperative grocery store—the Louisville Community Grocery. Cooperatives, like other forms of mutual aid, have long enabled socially marginalized groups to achieve greater economic security and control over their livelihoods. This is something that intrigues me as an economic anthropologist.

Not surprisingly, my classes reflect these interests. In addition to Introduction to Cultural Anthropology, I teach the Anthropology of Latin America, Farm and Food Movements in the Americas, Food Justice, History of Theory, Globalizing Inequalities, and People and their Food which is debuting this Spring. I'm also the Department's Director of Graduate Studies so if you are interested in our MA Program, please come talk with me.
