MINUTES OF THE SEPTEMBER 25, 2015 MEETING OF THE CURRICULUM COMMITTEE

The meeting was convened at 2:01 PM.

The minutes of the August 18, 2015, meeting were unanimously approved.

01-15F: Consideration of this submission was tabled at the department's request because a representative was not available.

02-15F: The Department of Criminal Justice proposed to revise its doctoral program's core curriculum. CJ 703 and CJ 748 will be consolidated as one course (CJ 748) and CJ 752, "Advanced Research Methods," will be added to the core requirements. The number of core hours will not be changed. The proposed change received the support of Associate Dean Pfeffer and was **APPROVED** by the Curriculum Committee.

03-15F: The committee **APPROVED** changing CJ 748's title from "Seminar in Criminal Justice Program Evaluation" to "Seminar in Criminal Justice Program Planning and Evaluation" and revision of the course description to read as follows: "This course features: introduction to the theory and practice of criminal justice planning, their strengths and weaknesses, the application of social scientific research methods to determine the effectiveness of criminal justice programs, analysis of reports of evaluative research and the preparation and analysis of evaluation research reports."

04-15F: The Department of Political Science proposed the addition of POLS 310, "Policy, Community, and Service." The committee applauded the syllabus' thoroughness, but concerns were raised about language in the syllabus that describes the course as a capstone experience. Dr. Payne explained that the course has been offered in the past and that the draft syllabus reflected the course's content and nature when last offered. As POLS 310, however, it will not be a capstone course. The committee **APPROVED** the creation of POLS 310 pending submission of a revised syllabus that removes all of the language referencing the course as a capstone experience. A slight modification also needs to be made to the CIF to reflect the required service learning hours.

05-15F: The Paralegal Studies program proposed the creation of an independent study option for students pursuing the AA in Paralegal Studies. Prof. Reid McIntosh noted that the content of the course will vary based on a given student's area of interest. The possibility for variety was reflected in the sample syllabus, which did not offer a reading list. The committee **APPROVED** the creation of PARA 395, "Independent Study for Paralegals," pending the submission of a syllabus with a sample reading list and revision to the CIF to reflect that students will be spending hours in the field, not in classroom lecture as the CIF currently reflects.

06-15F: The committee **APPROVED** the addition of PARA 327, "Evidence for Paralegals," formalizing its regular offering. The course has previously been offered as a special topics course.

07-15F: The committee **APPROVED** several proposed changes to PSYC 400. Its new title will be "Psychology Research and Public Communication." It will now be a 3-credit course instead of a 1-credit course. Students will receive letter grades. A course prerequisite was added (PSYC 201, 301-302 and consent of the instructor) and the course received a CUE designation.

08-15F-014-15F: The Department of Chemistry proposed the revision of course descriptions and/or prerequisite changes for the following organic chemistry courses: CHEM 341-344, CHEM 515, CHEM 545, and CHEM 547. The changes were made to clarify language, to make sure that curricular changes made since the original course descriptions were written were reflected, etc. The committee **APPROVED** all the proposed changes.

- CHEM 341: "Basic principles of organic chemistry: structure and geometry of molecules and consequential physical, chemical, and spectroscopic properties; chemical reactions, mechanism, and synthetic applications; industrial and biological examples." Prerequisites: Completion of CHEM 202 and 209.
- CHEM 342: "A continuation of the basic concepts and principles of modern chemistry. Topics include equilibrium, thermodynamics, kinetics, electrochemistry, nuclear chemistry and/or descriptive chemistry of the elements." Prerequisite: Completion of CHEM 341.
- CHEM 343: "Techniques of modern organic chemistry: synthesis, mechanistic studies, identification of unknowns by chemical and spectroscopic methods, special projects." Prerequisites: Concurrent enrollment in or completion of CHEM 341.
- CHEM 344: "Techniques of modern organic chemistry: synthesis, mechanistic studies, identification of unknowns by chemical and spectroscopic methods, special projects." Prerequisites: Concurrent enrollment in or completion of CHEM 342.
- CHEM 515: "Note: Credit may not be applied to an advanced degree in Chemistry. Descriptive and theoretical chemistry of the elements." Prerequisites: CHEM 342 and concurrent enrollment in or completion of CHEM 441 or CHEM 465.
- CHEM 545: "Note: Credit may not be earned in both CHEM 545 and CHEM 645 or in both CHEM 545 and CHEM 445. Credit may not be applied toward and advanced degree in Chemistry. Chemistry of amino acids, peptides, proteins, carbohydrates, nucleotides and nucleic acids; methods of analysis and laboratory synthesis; enzyme properties, kinetics, ligand binding." Prerequisite: CHEM 342.

15-15F: Dr. Nancy Theriot presented the Department of Women's and Gender Studies' proposed 3+3 track. The College of Arts and Sciences was approached by Brandeis School of Law about a partnership in which A&S departments would develop major tracks for students interested in legal study that would allow them to complete their undergraduate programs using first-year law courses. Successful students would then proceed into the second year of law school and would earn a BA and a JD in a total of six years. WGST's proposed law track differs from its other tracks in that it substitutes completion of first-year law courses for the required completion of a minor or concentration (18 to 21 hours) and the completion of additional elective credits. The committee APPROVED WGST's proposed 3+3 track. The proposed curriculum is appended to these minutes.

16-15F: Dr. David Owen presented the Department of Philosophy's proposed 3+3 track. Philosophy's proposed curriculum substituted law courses for philosophy courses currently required in the major and would require PHIL majors completing the 3+3 program to take the PHIL capstone course during either the second or third year of law school as one of the two electives outside of the law school that law students

are allowed to take. The committee **APPROVED** Philosophy's proposed 3+3 track. The proposed curriculum, edited to correct an error made in the original submission, is appended to these minutes.

17-15F: Drs. Michael Losavio and Gennaro Vito presented the Department of Criminal Justice's proposed 3+3 program. CJ's proposal removed courses in criminal procedure and criminal law from their requirements as that content will be taken in law courses. The committee **APPROVED** Criminal Justice's proposed 3+3 curriculum.

During its discussions, the committee raised concerns that students interested in pursuing one of the 3+3 programs will need very clear communications about these programs' requirements and about what one's "exit strategy" options would be if one were to decide not to complete law school.

The committee also communicated that it wishes for all departments submitting proposed curricular changes or innovations to submit brief cover memoranda explaining the nature of and rationale behind the change to help guide the committee in its review of proposals.

The meeting was adjourned at 2:44 PM.

The faculty of the Department of Criminal Justice have approved the participation of our students in cooperation or department in the 3+3 option for criminal justice majors. This option will allow high-performing students to take the first year of law school in completion of their requirements for a bachelor's degree in criminal justice.

The attached schedules show how a criminal justice major would arrange their courses is to take advantage of this option. It is a mix of direct required course substitution, given that there is overlap between our required courses and those of the law school, course credit for criminal justice electives and course credit for general electives.

This does require early counseling and advising of our students so that they may begin to arrange their schedules accordingly. We will also need to formalize and incorporate the admission guidelines for this program with law school admissions.
