


In Memoriam

Laurie Rhodebeck (Political Science)


- Taught courses in media in American politics, political parties and elections, and research methods.







TYPES OF COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

PARTNERSHIP: Ongoing collaboration with community partners for the mutually beneficial exchange of knowledge and resources in a context of partnership and reciprocity.

OUTREACH: Providing direct services, time, or resources to benefit a community or its institutions. Outreach includes short-term volunteer efforts, fundraising, and instances of <u>public intellectualism</u> such as talks, lectures, presentations, performances, etc.

CURRICULAR ENGAGEMENT: Describes course-related teaching, learning, and scholarship that engages students and the community in mutually beneficial and respectful collaboration. Also known as <u>Community Based</u> <u>Learning</u>.

ENGAGED SCHOLARSHIP: Scholarly work done in partnership with the community. It consists of <u>engaged research</u>, teaching, and the application of scholarship for the mutual benefit of the institution and community partner.

Statistics and definitions provided by the Office of Community Engagement. The count for 2015-16 for A&S is 170 a decrease of 23% from 2014-15.





This is where you come in. Stand up and make your voice heard.


