University Honors Program (louisville.edu/honors)

Students who demonstrate potential for high levels of achievement and seek a more engaging and challenging college experience find multiple opportunities for academic and personal development in the Honors Program. In addition to small classes, students have the opportunity to challenge themselves through research, study abroad, and experiential learning. Whether working side-by-side with faculty on cutting edge research projects, exploring international destinations, or serving the local community, Honors students have the chance to participate in unparalleled learning opportunities.

The University of Louisville hosts over 400 student organizations covering a wide variety of student interests. These groups provide a wonderful opportunity to become involved in campus life and to connect with other students on campus.

Student Orientation Staff (louisville.edu/newcards)

Being an SOSer is a great way to grow personally and professionally while helping new students transition to UofL through Orientation! As an SOSer, you will mentor and guide new students through the ins and outs of life as a Louisville Cardinal. This position is also a great way to make connections to campus.

Campus Housing Resident Assistant (louisville.edu/housing/jobs)

Resident Assistants (RAs) help advise students individually and in groups, assist in the administration of residence halls, and support/implement policies. In addition, students develop leadership qualities by providing initiative and leadership in developing opportunities for the intellectual, cultural, and social growth of residents.

Student Government Association (louisville.edu/dos/students/sga)

SGA works to be a voice for fellow students on campus and in the Commonwealth, and aims to provide an effective organization for the administration of student affairs that promotes and protects student rights and responsibilities. SGA also aims to create a stronger bond among students and student organizations as well as serve as an official channel for student opinions to be expressed.

International Service Learning (louisville.edu/islp)

The University of Louisville International Service Learning Program provides experiential education in which students engage in activities that address human and community needs together with structured opportunities intentionally designed to promote student learning and development. This interdisciplinary program contributes to campus internationalization by infusing the classroom with various cultures to prepare students to be more receptive to global and comparative perspectives.

Study Abroad (louisville.edu/studyabroad)

The Study Abroad program facilitates international educational experiences that provide opportunities for international study, research, or practical experiences outside of the United States. These enriching experiences foster critical thought, intellectual and social growth, knowledge and experiences for professional success, and responsible global citizenship.

Freshmen LEAD & Taskforce Freshmen (louisville.edu/studentactivities/leadership-opportunities)

Freshmen LEAD and Task Force Freshmen are among our most popular leadership programs for first-year students. Freshmen LEAD is focused on relational leadership and community service. Task Force Freshmen strives to prepare students for roles in student government and gives participants an opportunity to create policy proposals.
