

ClimateChangeEcon.net, a comprehensive website of resources and tools dedicated to addressing the carbon intensity of our economy and related climate change policy in the 50 states and territories, was launched in early December 2008. The web site's founder, Peter Meyer, director emeritus of CEPM and president of the E.P. Systems Group, Inc., aims to make ClimateChangeEcon.net the premier objective research tool for state and federal legislators, as well as regulators and policy analysts, on the economic opportunities presented by the fight against climate change.

By tapping into website's Legislators' Tools section, legislators across the country are able to access some tools to help dissect the assumptions that can distort research findings and provide these legislators a private forum for exchanging ideas with their peers.
