



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The concept behind "Hazardous to Healthy" involves transforming the site from an area dangerous to human occupation and into an area focused on improving the health of residents and furthering the understanding of health and medical science. The site will host buildings containing doctors' offices, University of Louisville research facilities, University of Louisville learning facilities, private research facilities, health and wellness learning stations, and outdoor rehabilitation areas.

The University of Louisville will take advantage of the campus and use the facilities to provide hands on training to students in general practitioner, dentistry, physical therapy, speech pathology, medical research, nutrition, nursing, and other medical programs to an area which in most cases is underserved. This opportunity will allow residents to obtain free or discounted medical care in exchange for experience provided to the students/participation in research programs.

Private medical offices will take advantage of the access to a new market and the government funding made available by practicing in an economically depressed area. The mixture of professionals and students will give students the ability to learn firsthand

The site will also host medical research and medical technology labs. These facilities will benefit the local population with access to cutting edge technology and research, while allowing professionals and researches the ability work alongside each

Economically, the area will develop as professionals, students, and patients need basic services. Food and labor services will move into the site, providing jobs for neighboring residents and creating the foundation for future economic activity. The "pan-handle" area of the site will be developed into outdoor rehabilitation/therapy park, and garden area. The rehab and therapy park can be used by various disciplines to engage patients in a more pleasant, relaxed, and natural environment. The garden areas will provide nutrition and other disciplines the ability to engage the public

on how to grow healthy foods and healthy eating habits. The hazardous aspects of the site will be mitigated by the placement of parking garages along the southern border of the site. This will conceal dangerous areas close to the old railcar loading area. The remainder of the site is to be paved for roads or developed for buildings, courtyards, and sidewalks. Much of the pan-handle, as previ-

stated, will use a soil cap. The street grid surrounding the site will be reintroduced allowing easy access to the site. The site will also be developed with great attention paid to bicycle paths as a great deal of locals use bicycles for transportation. Jan-Michael Lambdin 02/20/12


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




Final Master Plan






