
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



Fig 1: Sexting, a typology (Finkelhor and Wolak)

One unforeseen consequence of the rise of the internet has been an explosion in the illicit trade of child sexual abuse images and videos.

MORE THAN 29 MILLION REPORTS OF SUSPECTED CHILD SEXUAL EXPLOITATION ARE RECEIVED BY THE NATIONAL CENTER FOR MISSING & EXPLOITED CHILDREN ANNUALLY.





Suicide Risk

Approximately 4 times more likely to report suicidal ideation Approximately 5 times more likely to attempt suicide Suicidal ideation was linked to the use of technology for recruitment The involvement of technology was associated with 7.25 higher odds of experiencing suicidal ideation

Statistics Related to Death by Suicide

- One study found that youth who had sexted were 5.27 times more likely to have attempted suicide and 3.37 times more likely to have contemplated suicide than those who had not sexted.
- Young adolescents who experienced cyberbullying had an increased risk of suicidal thoughts or attempts.
 - NIH-funded researchers used data from more than 10,000 young adolescents. Almost 9
 percent of the young adolescents reported experiencing cyberbullying. The participants who
 reported experiences of cyberbullying were 4 times as likely to report thoughts of suicide and
 attempts.



How do we RESPOND?

Investigation, Trauma-Informed Response & Trauma-Informed Considerations



A TRAUMA-INFORMED APPROACH



INVESTIGATION

• Safety first!

- Identify & locate victim
- Medical treatment needed?
- Minimal facts interview to assess for safety
- Provide crisis intervention
- Reporting requirements
- Key questions to consider
 - What is already known about the child(ren) or young people involved?
 - How has the image been shared?
 - What do we know about intent or motivation behind creating or sharing the imagery?
 - What is the impact of the child(ren) or young people involved?
- What do you do with the image(s)?
- Should we use parents/caregivers to identify images?
- Are the youth charged?
- Are the youth charged for being the one to produce or share the image(s)?
- How do we talk to the youth about an upcoming FI in a trauma-informed manner that also protects the integrity of the FI?

TRAUMA-INFORMED RESPONSE & CONSIDERATIONS



Trauma-Informed Practices

Screening

Child trafficking, ACEs, suicide

Trauma-Specific Treatment

Provide evidence-based, trauma-focused behavioral health interventions (TF-CBT)

Training & Education

Train staff at all levels (awareness, risk factors, warning signs, & trauma-informed service provision)

Mandated Reporting Requirements

Develop protocols for mandated reporting requirements for CSEC/CSAM

Suicide Prevention & Intervention Strategies

All screening and assessment protocols should also include suicide assessment measures: Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scale.

Include suicide prevention and interventions tailored to address the needs of HT/CSAM victims and increase efforts to deliver these services to populations of at-risk youth (e.g., homeless youth).

Columbia Suicide Severity Rating Scale – Triage Version for Primary Care Settings (Columbia Lighthouse Project, 2016)

- Brief, 6-question assessment of past and current ideation and behavior
- Includes guidelines regarding how professionals can direct individuals to various levels of care based on their responses

If YES to 2 or 3, seek behavioral healthcare for further evaluation. If the answer to 4, 5 or 6 is YES, get <u>immediate help</u>: Call or text 988, call 911 or go to the emergency room. <u>STAY WITH THEM</u> until they can be evaluated.




