National recognition for UofL DEI efforts

As the University of Louisville strengthens its commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion, achieving national recognition is a part of that success story.

INSIGHT Into Diversity magazine has again recognized UofL with multiple accolades for its outstanding efforts to advance diversity and inclusion. For a tenth consecutive year, the national publication awarded University of Louisville with the Higher Education Excellence in Diversity

(HEED) Award for 2023. For a fifth year, the UofL Health Sciences Center (HSC) has earned the Health Professions HEED Award, and the Cardinals have been selected as Diversity Champions for a fourth year - a distinction given only to institutions scoring in the top tier of all HEED Award winners. The inaugural INSIGHT Into Diversity 2024 Library Excellence in Access and Diversity (LEAD) Award also was given to University of Louisville Libraries.

CODRE Spring Listening Sessions

Planning for CODRE's spring 2024 Listening Session Series is underway. This semester's sessions will cover such topics as UofL's diversity strategic plan and free speech on campus. CODRE will also partner with the Commission on the Status of Women (COSW) to facilitate additional topics.

The CODRE listening sessions will take place the weeks of February 26, March 25 and April 22. Faculty, staff and students are welcome to attend. To provide a safe and open environment, the sessions will not be recorded. Names of those who offer insights and

questions will not be included in the thematic summaries for each session.

Anti-DEI legislation

Legislation recently introduced in the Kentucky General Assembly is raising concerns about anti-diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) efforts in higher education.

Kentucky House Bill 9 defines diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives as policies, practices or procedures intended to provide differential treatment or benefits to someone based on religion, race, sex, color or national origin. The bill would ban postsecondary institutions from using any money, facilities, social media and webpages, faculty or staff to create or maintain a DEI office, hire DEI officers, provide DEI trainings or establish any DEI initiatives.

Kentucky Senate Bill 6 involves several so-called "divisive concepts," including the concept of systemic inequality and inherent privilege based on race or sex. The bill would ban public colleges and universities from asking current or prospective students or employees about their support or opposition to any of the divisive concepts listed in the bill. It would also prohibit mandatory trainings that include any of the concepts.

UofL is currently reviewing the legislation and assessing potential impacts on the university. The <u>Chronicle of Higher Education's DEI Legislation Tracker</u> provides frequent updates on how these bills are moving through the General Assembly.



CODRE Awards: Call for Nominations

CODRE is accepting nominations for its 2024 Diversity Awards. Nominations for the Presidential Exemplary Multicultural Teaching Award, Presidential Exemplary Multicultural Staff Award, DEI Student Leader Award and Commissioner of the Year Award are being accepted through March 1.

Working with Workplace Flexibility

Lack of flexible and remote work is the No. 2 reason (behind compensation) that employees in higher education leave their jobs. The availability of flexible and remote work options can be especially beneficial to those with disabilities, caregiving responsibilities and more.

Anita Hall, chair of work-life integration for UofL's Commission on the Status of Women (COSW), and Sarah Frankel, COSW's co-vice chair of work-life integration, facilitated a discussion about workplace flexibility at the Nov. 9, 2023, CODRE Listening Session.

Attendees weighed in on the impact of flexible/remote work options, supervising flexible/remote employees, how UofL can best support flexible/remote options and more.

UofL quarterback Randy Butler

In 1976, Randy Butler made his start on the Louisville Cardinals football team to become the University of Louisville's first Black quarterback.

A native of Commerce, Georgia, Butler got his first snap against the University of Alabama as a sophomore. While he would later transition to receiver, his accomplishment paved the way for Louisville quarterback icons Teddy Bridgewater and Lamar Jackson.

At the time, he had no idea he was breaking barriers.

"I was just going out there and playing football, it wasn't until later I realized the magnitude of the situation" Butler said.

Butler went on to lead the Cardinals in receptions and receiving yards and later signed a free agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons.

Butler, who lives in the Atlanta area, said he is proud of the university and its improvement in efforts to recognize Black athletes.

"It makes me happy to see how the university has come a long way with regards to diversity standards," he said.

The Commission on Diversity and Racial Equity (CODRE) was established in 1998 by University of Louisville President John Shumaker, to promote a campus culture of inclusion and engagement. CODRE strives to foster and sustain an environment of inclusiveness that empowers us all to achieve our highest potential without fear of prejudice or bias.
