CODRE talks recruitment and retention

Student and employee recruitment and retention are among the priorities in the University of Louisville's 2023-25 Strategic Plan. (See strategies L1 and W2 of the <u>Strategic Plan</u>.) However, new laws that end universities' race-based affirmative action admissions standards and diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) work raise questions about how universities can maintain a strong ethos of anti-racism.

On Oct. 18, 2023, CODRE hosted its first campus-wide listening session of the 2023-24 academic year. Session facilitators Sherri Wallace, professor of political science and interim associate dean of the College of Arts and Sciences Office of Diversity, and Derek Cowherd, associate athletics director for DEI, addressed a series of topics around "How will UofL recruit and retain racial diversity?"

The nearly 40 attendees shared their thoughts on how the Supreme Court's decision and attacks on DEI impacted them personally and professionally. Concerns about how these efforts may impact UofL were also shared.

Comments and feedback are compiled into a summary that is given to the president and campus leadership. The summaries, as well as CODRE's other programs and resources,
