- Founded in Spring 2014 with an LBAF grant & funding from the Greenebaum Public Service Program
- Now a three year fellowship for entering law students providing leadership development, subject matter expertise, and meaningful community engagement
- Collaboration between the university, service providers, and local immigrant, and refugee communities, and other local communities
- Public education campaigns
