Message from the Director

Dear Friends:

On behalf of the Kentucky Autism Training Center (KATC) Advisory Board, University of Louisville's College of Education and Human Development, and KATC staff, I am proud to present the KATC's 2019-2020 Annual Report for our 23nd year of service to the autism community of Kentucky. Since the establishment of the KATC in 1996 by the Kentucky General Assembly, the need for integrated and systemic supports and services across all regions of the Commonwealth continues to increase. KATC, like the rest of the world, has experienced some significant challenges from March to the present in providing support to our families and service providers alike. While the pandemic has been a barrier to our in-person training, we have continued to provide services by expanding our virtual format resources.

This report represents a summary of our work in the areas of information dissemination, training, coaching and various other supports. Each section provides an overview of the services, supports provided, and information regarding endeavors with our collaborative partners. In addition to the areas detailed above, it is important to note the many hours KATC staff spend providing resources and supports via telephone calls, virtual consultations, committee meetings, community awareness events, and resource fairs even when a pandemic is not present. Individuals with autism, their families, and service providers need access and opportunities to promote the best possible outcomes in all areas affected by autism.

Establishing and maintaining collaborative partnerships with professionals and related agencies has proven to be productive in moving KATC toward the initial vision of improving the lives of those affected by autism. This has been especially important with the ever-changing and often challenging fiscal climate. With that said, we would like to specifically acknowledge our partnerships with the Regional Educational Cooperatives, Human Development Institute at UK, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, and the Office of Autism. Through these collaborations, the KATC has been successful at leveraging resources and bolstering efforts across the Commonwealth. In a 12 month span, the KATC connected with individuals from 84 of the 120 counties in Kentucky!

On behalf of the KATC Advisory Board and the KATC staff of eight, I would like to thank the many individuals and agencies who support the work of KATC. A special thank you to the KY General Assembly for their continued support.

KATC's work during COVID-19







KATC's State-wide Reach

In 2020 KATC has reached 84 of the 120 counties in Kentucky through our First Responder Trainings, collaborative work with the Office of Autism, Training Site Initiative, and other events/trainings.



Parent and Professional Trainings

Assessing Autism Spectrum Disorder: Meeting the Challenge

The KATC hosted a two day assessment training on August 27 & 28 in Georgetown, KY for evaluation professionals who have prior education, training and supervised experience in the area of Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). The training was conducted by Dr. Marilyn Monteiro and Dr. Ann K. Rogers. Participants were introduced to the practical framework for diagnosing autism in children, adolescents, and adults using the Monteiro Interview Guidelines for Diagnosing Autism Spectrum (MIGDAS-2). Participants were also introduced to survey of additional tools designed to comprehensively evaluate individuals who have been referred for suspected ASD.

ADOS-2

The KATC hosted a two-day Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule (ADOS-2) training in Bowling Green, KY on September 19 & 20. Participants from across the Commonwealth of Kentucky who attended the event were clinical and school psychologists, psychiatrists, developmental pediatricians, therapists and others that have prior education, training, and experience in conducting assessments. The training was conducted by Rachel Hundley, Ph.D., Assistant Professor of Pediatrics, Division of Developmental Medicine; Assistant Professor of Psychiatry; Psychologist, Vanderbilt Kennedy Center Learning Assessment Clinic Dr. Rachel Hundley is a clinical psychologist who specializes in the assessment and ongoing care for children with developmental disabilities, emotional and behavioral concerns, and autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

Autism Transition Summit

The KATC partnered with the UK Human Development Institute, Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Kentucky Autism Training Center, and the Office of Autism, to provide training to parents, self-advocates, caregivers and professionals on supporting individuals with autism as they transition into employment. The two and half day event titled Autism Transition Summit: Focus on Employment was on March 10 -12, 2020 in Louisville, KY. Approximately 100 people attended. Day one included a Keynote by Ivanova Smith a self advocate and the day ended with Community Conversations. Day two was a full day of breakout sessions and we ended the last day with mock interviews and resume review for self advocates. Our hosts of presenters included self advocates, parents across the state and career development advisors from UofL.



Training Site Initiative

The Kentucky Autism Training Center (KATC), in partnership with the Kentucky Department of Education (KDE), and the Regional Educational Cooperatives, provides learning opportunities to professionals and parents of students with autism. These opportunities are designed to increase the positive outcomes for learners with autism by the time they exit their high school experience. An initiative that has been of benefit to local schools over the past 10 years is the establishment of "Training Sites". Schools apply to participate, and if accepted, receive focused onsite technical assistance from KATC and consultants from the Regional Special Education Cooperatives to enhance the school personnel's skills to serve students with autism.



Training Site Initiative

Criterion:

- Administrative support and engagement
- Teacher who serves students with ASD
- Teacher who demonstrates responsiveness to professional learning
- Commitment to partner with the regional cooperative consultant
- School personnel demonstrate a desire to build district capacity
- Commitment to participate in regional cadre trainings related to autism

General Guidelines:

- School may apply for multiple classrooms
- Teacher completes the application form (collaboratively if multiple teachers)
- Involved personnel are each in good standing with school/district (teacher is not on a corrective improvement plan, student with autism is not a part of the dispute resolution process, etc.)
- All classroom staff and related service staff must review the application and sign to show their commitment
- District director of special education must be informed of the application submission

First Responder Initiative

The KATC offers a two-hour training currently approved for two CE/Contact Hours from the KY Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) and KY Fire Commission State Fire Rescue Training.

Topics include:

- Explaining what autism is, including characteristics and spectrum of how these characteristics are expressed among individuals with autism
- Reviewing frequently used terms, interventions, and common types/titles of caregivers
- Understanding how to respond to and interact with individual(s) with autism, including communication strategies
- Identify de-escalation strategies that could be utilized with individuals with autism
- Reviewing local, state-wide, and national resources related to autism



Additional Partnerships

Office for Children with Special Health Care Needs

The Autism Initiative in Treatment, Training, and Research (KAITTR) provides diagnostic and/or treatment clinics in collaboration with the Office for Children for Special Health Care Needs (OCSHCN) and physicians from the University of Louisville Autism Center (ULAC) in 5 regions in Kentucky. The team typically consists of a developmental pediatrician, child psychiatrist, and a neurologist who work in conjunction with the OCSHCN staff. KATC provided initial and on-going training for OCSHCN staff at these clinics. KATC Field Training Coordinators partner with the ULAC and Norton physicians and OCSHCN staff to support the families by identifying resources and services to address their specific needs, especially related to the child's school programming. KATC staff have provided almost 30 hours of support and collaboration for this work during the 2019-2020 reporting period at the Owensboro and Bowling Green clinic sites.



Office of Autism

KATC's Executive Director is a Governor-appointed member on the Kentucky Advisory Council on Autism. Additionally, KATC staff are active participants in each of the Council's three subcommittees: Early Childhood, School-Age, and Adolescent/Adult. The KATC partnered with the Office of Autism in planning, presenting, and facilitating the Autism Transition Summit: Focus on employment in Louisville, KY.

Training for First Responders

The KATC staff can provide a training at a variety of times and days of the week to best meet the needs of the requesting agency. For example, one agency needed a single session with 65 participants, while another agency requested 1,200 individuals be trained by offering the training over 20 times. Requesting a First Responders Training provides the opportunity for discussion, brainstorming and problem solving, as well as enhanced connections amongst participants.

• Training for Professionals

The KATC staff can provide training on autism and related topics to professional and community groups across Kentucky. The KATC encourages professional groups to work in collaboration with KATC to design a presentation to meet your group's needs.

Training for Groups

The KATC staff can provide 1 to 1.5 hour workshops on autism and related topics, as part of an ongoing effort to improve services for those affected with ASD in Kentucky. Autism related support groups and other family groups across Kentucky can access these workshops free of charge. Although we have a list of suggested topics on our website, we encourage family groups to work in collaboration with our trainers to design a presentation to meet your support group's needs.
