The following UofL student-athletes received the 1A FAR Academic Excellence Award, which recognizes outstanding student-athletes for their significant accomplishments in the classroom while competing at the highest level of college sports. This award is given annually to student-athletes who graduate with a cumulative GPA of 3.80 or above and have participated in at least two years of NCAA Intercollegiate athletics at a FBS institution. Update on Legal Betting on Professional Sports: Please see this article from Jenn Fraser, NCAA Senior Vice President of Governance and Member Services, published on November 21, 2025.

As you are likely aware, all three NCAA divisions voted in October to change rules for sports betting that would permit student-athletes and athletics department staff members to engage in legal betting on professional sports only.

Today, Division I's procedural 30-day rescission period closed on the pending rule change for sports betting rules, and the necessary two-thirds of DI schools have voted to rescind the rule change.

Because sports betting rules are common legislation, the rule change <u>will not</u> move forward for any NCAA division.

All forms of betting on any NCAA-sponsored sport — amateur, collegiate and professional — remain strictly prohibited for student-athletes and athletics department staff members.

While those rules remain in place, legalized sports betting is continuing to grow nationwide, and the national office stands ready to assist schools with educating student-athletes about the harms — beyond potential impacts to their eligibility — associated with gambling behaviors.

Some of the resources available to schools include:

- The NCAA Sport Science Institute released <u>Harm Reduction Considerations for Gambling & Sports</u> Betting in Collegiate Sports earlier this year.
- The NCAA has partnered with EPIC Global Solutions to provide a comprehensive gambling harm and student-athlete protection educational program for member schools and conferences across all three divisions. The program offers a blend of delivery options,

including in-person education workshops and seminars, prerecorded sessions, and ondemand virtual resources. To schedule a free EPIC session, please email <u>ncaa@epicglobalsolutions.com</u>.

- The NCAA has <u>updated its e-learning module</u> for student-athletes on problem gambling harms, NCAA sports betting rules and the integrity risks associated with sports betting.
- In March 2024, the NCAA launched the <u>Draw the Line</u> campaign, intended to increase education and grow awareness of the complexities of sports betting. The campaign prioritizes student-athlete education on the effects of sports betting while also addressing responsible gambling for all who consume and participate in college sports. The campaign also includes a <u>membership toolkit</u> for member schools and conferences to access resources that extend the campaign for on-campus education.

The NCAA also continues its efforts to shield student-athletes from betting-related harassment by fans, including:

- The NCAA engaged <u>Signify Group</u> to provide its <u>Threat Matrix</u> artificial intelligence service to support the Association in studying and responding to online abuse and threats directed at NCAA championship participants, including student-athletes, coaches, officials and committee members.
- The NCAA has teamed up with <u>Venmo</u> to curb the harassment of student-athletes. This collaboration includes increased protections for student-athletes on Venmo, including a dedicated abuse reporting hotline, <u>best practices guide</u>, account support and user education.
- In March 2025, the NCAA launched a new video that airs during championships broadcasts, as well as online, as part of the <u>Draw the Line</u> campaign. The spot, titled "<u>Don't</u> <u>Be a Loser</u>," calls attention to the alarming prevalence of abuse and harassment student-athletes face from angry fans who lose a bet.
- · The Association has successfully petitioned four states to eliminate prop bets on college athletes and continues to urge lawmakers to eliminate risky prop bets that threaten competition integrity and student-athlete well-being.
- The national office will implement <u>player availability reports</u> for the 2026 Division I Men's and Women's Basketball Championships. Player availability reports during the tournaments can reduce the betting-related pressure, solicitations and harassment student-athletes receive connected to their playing status.
