It's that time of year again, Honors students, so mark your calendars and set your alarms to be sure to grab an Honors advising appointment as soon as you can! We are looking forward to seeing everyone again to check in on how things are going this semester and to help you get things planned out for your Summer and Fall semesters. Please be sure to check out all of the details below on how to set up your Honors advising appointment, and we'll see you soon!

The Procedure

Honors Scholars: Around 7:45 AM on Tuesday, February 6 scholars will receive the EAB/CardSmart campaign e-mail from Kirsten Armstrong in their UofL accounts.

General Honors: Around 7:45 AM on Wednesday, February 7 all Honors students will receive the EAB/CardSmart campaign e-mail from Kirsten Armstrong in their UofL accounts.

Once you receive your email:

- Click on the link and sign up online for an Honors advising appointment within EAB/CardSmart.
***Please note: If you do not receive an appointment confirmation email from EAB/CardSmart, the appointment has not been successfully scheduled, and you must return to the link and ensure that you have completed all of the steps in the scheduling process.**
- Everyone's EAB/CardSmart scheduling links are unique to their own account information, so please do not forward or share these links with other students.

BOREN AWARDS

The Boren Awards provide up to \$20,000 to U.S. undergraduates, and up to \$24,000 to graduate students, to study abroad in areas of the world that are critical to U.S. interests and underrepresented in study abroad. Boren Scholars represent a variety of academic backgrounds—from Global Health, to Economics, to STEM disciplines—but all are interested in studying less commonly taught languages and building regional expertise in parts of the world of U.S. national security interest. You can apply for a Boren Scholarship as a sophomore, junior, even a senior (if you delay graduation).

The Boren Summer STEM Initiative provides up to \$8,000 for 8 weeks of summer study abroad for students in science, technology, engineering, and math majors. Students can choose to pursue

- Language Study
- Language Study + Academic Coursework
- Language Study with a STEM-Related Internship







Genre Specific Guidelines

- Attached Word Document
- Limit 3 pieces per submission cycle.
- Times New Roman, size 12 font.
- 1" margins, double-spaced.
- Page numbers at bottom right-hand corner.
- Please do not exceed 3,000 words per piece.

Poetry

- Attached Word Document
- Limit 3 poems per submission cycle.
- Times New Roman, size 12 font
- 1" margins, left alignment preferred
- We will make every effort to preserve the spacing and format of your poetry as it is sent.

Visual Art

- Attached .JPEG or .PNG file
- Image quality: 300 DPI or higher
- If you are submitting images of 2D or 3D art, please consider the quality and composition of the image to suit the magazine format.



Unbridled Hunger: Food Insecurity Challenges & Solutions for Kentucky Wednesday, January 24 • 6:00 - 7:00 PM Ekstrom Library, Chao Auditorium

The McConnell Center's spring lecture series kicks-off with guest speaker Ryan Quarles, Commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Agriculture, on "Unbridled Hunger: Food Insecurity Challenges & Solutions for Kentucky." Quarles, the youngest statewide elected official in the country, formed the Kentucky Hunger Initiative, a first-of-its-kind effort to bring together farmers, charitable organizations, faith groups, community leaders and government entities to help reduce hunger in the state. One out of six Kentuckians is considered food insecure, and Quarles' talk will cover a range of public policy impacts, including the effects of food insecurity in health care and education in rural and urban parts of Kentucky. The free event is part of the center's "Taking Kentucky's Temperature: Future of Health Policy in the Commonwealth" public lecture series.
