HONORS SEMINARS: SPRING 2020

BOARD OF OVERSEERS INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL SEMINAR HUMANS & THEIR ENVIRONMENT

HON 441/451-07 // TTH, 1:00 - 2:15 DR. CARA CASHON FULFILLS SOCIAL SCIENCES OR NATURAL SCIENCES CREDIT ESTIMATED TRAVEL COST: \$2200

This seminar will focus on how humans interact with their environment in today's world from psychological and cultural perspectives. Human connectedness to nature, nature-protective behaviors, environmental justice, climate change and misinformation, sustainable solutions, and ecotourism will be discussed with the goal of better understanding. The course will culminate in a trip to two places where locals have unique relationships with their local surroundings: Iceland and the Netherlands. Students will experience both the breathtaking natural world of the "Land of Fire and Ice," with its volcanos, waterfalls, geysers, and lagoons, and where residents receive electricity from 100% renewable sources, as well as the unique water canals and cycling culture of Amsterdam, also known as the "Venice of the North" and "City of Bikes," where residents prefer bikes over cars for their daily transportation and tulip season takes over in the spring. Students should be prepared for a trip full of wonderful outdoor adventures and interactions with the natural world!

The Fulbright U.S. Student Program provides study, research, and teaching opportunities in over 140 countries. Last year, UofL students and alumni won 12 Fulbright awards, earning the University its fifth recognition as a Top Producing Institution.

If a career in international affairs and foreign policy interests you, consider applying for these fellowships!

Women, minorities, and candidates with financial need are particularly encouraged to apply; applicants can (and should!) apply to **both** programs. Students from any major who seek to promote positive change are invited to apply.

Both fellowships include:

- Up to \$95,000 to support 2 years of graduate study
- 2 paid internships (one on Capitol Hill and one at an overseas U.S. Embassy or consulate)
- Mentorship by individuals with careers in foreign affairs
- A 5-year service Foreign Service appointment.

Applicants must:

- Have a GPA of 3.2 or higher
- Be seeking entry to graduate school for Fall 2020
- · Have a record of academic excellence, leadership, and commitment to public service
