APPLY FOR THE MASS SCHOLARSHIP

Students with demonstrable financial need and involvement in the University Honors Program may apply for awards to buy books and supplies for spring semester classes. Funds for these awards were originally contributed by members of the Mature Adult Student Society (MASS).

Two to three scholarships (ranging from \$300 to \$400) are awarded. Applications consist of a letter outlining your academic program, overall financial need, and projected expenses of books for the spring semester.

WE'RE HIRING! BECOME AN HONORS PEER ADVISOR

If you are interested in helping incoming Honors students during Summer Freshman Orientation, apply to become an Honors Peer Advisor! Honors Peer Advisors work closely with the Honors Program advising staff and administrators, assist first-years with the course selection and registration process during orientation, and promote and discuss the University Honors Program to incoming Honors first-years and

their family members. Those selected to become Honors Peer Advisors will need to be available for training and all Summer Orientation sessions. Training will take place in mid-May while Orientation sessions will run through the end of June. If you are planning on taking summer courses, pursuing research programs, or have any other local summer plans, please keep the Orientation schedule in mind when applying. Honors Peer Advisors typically work between 15-20 hours weekly.

HUMANS & THEIR ENVIRONMENT



ESTIMATED TRAVEL: BETWEEN APRIL 28 - MAY 12

This seminar will focus on how humans interact with their environment in today's world from psychological and cultural perspectives. Human connectedness to nature, nature-protective behaviors, environmental justice, climate change and misinformation, sustainable solutions, and ecotourism will be discussed with the goal of better understanding. The course will culminate in a trip to two places where locals have unique relationships with their local surroundings: Iceland and the Netherlands. Students will experience both the breathtaking natural world of the "Land of Fire and Ice," with its volcanos, waterfalls, geysers, and lagoons, and where residents receive electricity from 100% renewable sources, as well as the unique water canals and cycling culture of Amsterdam, also known as the "Venice of the North" and "City of Bikes," where residents prefer bikes over cars for their daily transportation and tulip season takes over in the spring. Students should be prepared for a trip full of wonderful outdoor adventures and interactions with the natural world!

Questions to be explored include: How do we assign labels to our complicated experiences of sexuality? Where do we fall on various sexuality continua? How do we label? How old were we when we came to our identities and to our sexualities? How asexual/sexual are we? How well do our friends and family members understand us?

This program will expand your perspective and change the way you think about labels. Come as you are and with an open mind - students, faculty, and staff are all welcome and encouraged to attend.




STAY HYDRATED




...BUT DO GET SOME SLEEP!

USAID DONALD PAYNE INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP

The **USAID Donald Payne International Development Graduate Fellowship** is now accepting applications for the 2020 Cohort of Payne Fellows. The Payne Fellowship is a U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) Program, administered by Howard University, which seeks to attract and prepare outstanding individuals for careers as USAID Foreign Service Officers. Candidates can be graduating seniors or college graduates with strong academic records and a desire to promote positive change in the world. The Payne program encourages the application of members of historically underrepresented groups in the Foreign Service and those with financial need. Selected fellows will receive support for graduate school and gain employment with USAID in an exciting and rewarding career in the Foreign Service.

PROGRAM BENEFITS

THE USAID FOREIGN SERVICE

An orientation to the Program and the Foreign Service at Howard University in Washington, D.C. in late spring 2020.

Two summer internships, one on Capitol Hill in summer 2020 and one overseas at a USAID Mission in summer 2021.

Up to \$22,000 annually toward tuition, fees and living expenses for a two-year master's degree in fields related to the Foreign Service such as development, economics, public administration, business administration, global health, agriculture, or environmental science at a U.S.-based institution.

Mentoring from a Foreign Service Officer throughout the duration of the fellowship.

Employment in the USAID Foreign Service for those who successfully complete the program and meet Foreign Service entry requirements, in accordance with applicable law and USAID policy, with each Payne Fellow committing to a minimum of five years of service.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

U.S. citizenship.

Seeking admission to graduate school in fall 2020 for a twoyear program in an area of relevance to the Foreign Service at a U.S.-based institution.

Cumulative grade point average of 3.2 or higher on a 4.0 scale at the time of application.

USAID Foreign Service Officers work on the front lines of some of the most pressing global challenges of our times, including poverty, hunger, injustice, disease, environmental degradation, climate change, conflict and violent extremism. They are part of a corps of officers who have worked for more than fifty years to make lasting improvements to the lives of millions of people around the globe. USAID Foreign Service Officers are stationed in Washington and in more than 75 countries in five regions worldwide – Africa, Latin America and the Caribbean, Europe and Eurasia, Asia, and the Middle East. They work alongside colleagues from other U.S. government agencies to achieve our country's foreign policy objectives in democracy and governance, economic growth and trade, peace and security, education and health, conflict mitigation and humanitarian response.

CRITICAL LANGUAGE SCHOLARSHIP [ALL DISCIPLINES, ALL LEVELS]

DEADLINE: WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 27, 2019

The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) is a summer scholarship designed to provide students with the opportunity to study critical languages in countries of national security interest to the U.S. State Department. The eight to ten week program includes intensive language instruction and structured cultural enrichment experiences designed to promote rapid language gains and cultural immersion.

CLS plays an important role in preparing students for the 21st century's globalized workforce and increasing national competitiveness. The following languages are eligible for study:

Two years of prior study required: Chinese, Japanese

One year of prior study required: Arabic, Korean, Portuguese, Russian

No prior study required: Azerbaijani, Bangla, Hindi, Persian, Punjabi, Indonesian, Korean, Swahili, Turkish, Urdu

THE PPIA JUNIOR SUMMER INSTITUTE FELLOWSHIP PROGRAM

DEADLINE: FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 1, 2019

The PPIA Junior Summer Institute (JSI) Fellowship Program is a rigorous academic graduate-level preparation program for undergraduate juniors committed to public service careers. The program was started to address the lack of diversity across the spectrum of professional public service, including government, nonprofits, public policy institutions, and international organizations. The purpose of the JSI Fellowship is to prepare students to obtain a Master's or joint degree, in public policy, public administration, international affairs, or a related field.

This fully-funded opportunity equips fellows with the knowledge and skills they will need to succeed in graduate school and ultimately, in influential roles serving the public good. Once a student has successfully completed their JSI, they join an alumni network of more than 4,000 leaders. In addition to the opportunities that this network provides for mentoring and career development, our alumni network has the opportunity to receive financial support for their graduate school education if they attend one of the programs in our Graduate School Consortium.

The JSI curriculum includes economics, statistics, domestic/international policy issues, and leadership topics, all designed to sharpen the students' quantitative, analytic, and communication skills. Extracurricular activities are included, as well. These skills are vital for admission into the top graduate programs in public and international affairs. The successful completion of a summer institute is a requirement for PPIA Fellows to qualify for graduate school benefits.
