

### HONORS IS HIRING! APPLY FOR THE PEER ADVISORS

If you are interested in helping incoming Honors students during Summer Freshman Orientation, apply to become an Honors Peer Advisor! Honors Peer Advisors work closely with the Honors Program advising staff and administrators, assist first-years with the course selection and registration process during orientation, and promote and discuss the University Honors Program to incoming Honors first-years and their family members. Those selected to become



Honors Peer Advisors will need to be available for training and all Summer Orientation sessions. Training will take place in mid-May while Orientation sessions will run through mid-July. If you are planning on taking summer courses, pursuing research programs, or have any other local summer plans, please keep the Orientation schedule in mind when applying. Honors Peer Advisors typically work between 15-20 hours weekly. It is a paid position.

December 21: Winter Solstice. The first day of winter begins a period of renewal for groups such as the Pueblo people, including the Zuni, Hopi, Hopi-Tewa, and Keresan tribes. Prayer, ceremony, and dances by masked fig-

• ures called the Katsina (protector spirits) turn the sun back toward its summer path and bless the community. It is

also celebrated as Yule by modern pagans, stemming from pre-Christian/Germanic traditions. Pagans view it as a

renewal period as well, in which the Goddess gives birth to the Sun. A Yule Log is burned and gifts are exchanged.

**December 22 - 30: Hanukkah.** In Judea in 168 B.C., a Syrian king of the Seleucid Empire outlawed Judaism and a revolution began. It succeeded, and the restoration of religious freedom and the rededication of Jerusalem's Holy Temple is commemorated through Hanukkah. Upon reclamation of the Temple, a lamp that had only one night's worth of oil burned for eight. Because of this miracle, Jewish families gather for eight nights to exchange gifts, spend time together, and light the menorah as a reminder that there is always light in the dark.

**December 24: Christmas Eve.** The evening before Christmas is celebrated by Christians and non-religious people alike by decorating a pine tree, singing songs, and leaving cookies out for Santa - a magical figure who lives in the North Pole and delivers presents to children across the globe. Santa is based on St. Nicholas, a fourth-century saint who was known for his generosity and secret gift-giving. Religious families often attend a special Christmas Eve church service on this night.

# HONORS NEWS WINTER HOLIDAYS CONTINUED

**December 25: Christmas Day.** Celebrated by Christian people worldwide as the birth of Jesus, the son of God and savior of humankind. Christmas is a time to reflect on the story of his birth, celebrate the miracle of life, and exchange presents to represent the gifts that three kings/wisemen gave to the infant Jesus. Christmas is also celebrated as a secular holiday; families get together to exchange gifts, bake winter-themed treats, and watch movies about Santa, Rudolph, and Christmas elves! Many families incorporate both religious and non-religious traditions into their Christmas celebrations.

**December 26 - January 1: Kwanzaa.** This holiday was created in 1966 by author and scholar Maulana Karenga as a way for African-American families to remember and honor their cultures, history, and heritage. Kwanzaa culminates in a feast (karamu) that celebrates community and family. Gifts are exchanged and seven candles are lit to represent the seven basic values of African-American family life: unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.

**December 31: New Year's Eve.** In order to prepare for the new year, people gather with family and friends to reflect on the last 12 months and think of ways they will do better for themselves and each other. Though the celebratory details vary across the U.S., lots of food, alcohol, fireworks, and music are normally part of the night-time celebration. A countdown in New York City's Times Square is televised live, and many people stay up late to watch it.

**January 1: New Year's Day.** New Year's Day is celebrated as the chance to change old habits and start fresh in order to create a better future. Much of the day might be spent cleaning up from the night before!

## CALL FOR APPLICATIONS: THE MARY CHURCHILL HUMPHREY SCHOLARSHIP

You must contact the National and International Scholarships Office by **December 3 (TODAY!)** if you wish to begin an application. **Email NISO@Iouisville.edu**.

Mary Churchill Humphrey endowed the University of Louisville Centenary Memorial Scholarship in the late 1940s. This scholarship has enabled graduates of the College of Arts & Sciences to pursue advanced study in the United Kingdom for more than fifty years. Graduating seniors, recent alumni, and graduate students are eligible; applicants must have at least one major in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Candidates may apply to study at any university in the U.K. The MCH may be used to complete a oneyear graduate degree, or be used in the first year of a longer graduate degree program. The scholarship will cover a portion of the winning scholar's tuition and expenses; the exact amount of this year's MCH monetary award has not been set.

#### Applications are due January 24, 2020.

The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship funds the undergraduate study of college students who intend to pursue careers as high-level researchers in science, mathematics, and engineering.
