DR. JENNIFER GREGG: HONORS SEMINAR SPOTLIGHT

Why should students enroll in Honors Seminars? Honors Seminars are a great way to meet faculty and students from different departments around campus. Once you're a junior or senior, you tend to see the same people in all your classes because you're getting into the specialty courses of your major. If you're in a seminar, though, you're taking an upper-level elective from a specialist in their field that you don't necessarily have to be a specialist in that field yourself. It's a class that no one else in your major gets to take (except for honors students!), and it's a chance to meet new people. It's also a chance to take something outside of traditional course offerings.

What advice would you give to students considering taking Honors Seminars?

Keep an open mind...just because a course is in a different department or is outside of your comfort zone, don't immediately discount it. One of the wonderful things about college is new experiences. Sometimes students from the natural sciences are intimidated by my classes because they don't follow a traditional lecture/test model. Students sometimes aren't used to class discussions or presentations. But once they realize we're all in it together, it's fun!

Why do you enjoy leading Honors Seminars?

First and foremost...the students! Honors students are the best students on campus. I LOVE hearing what honors students are working on and what their goals are. Second, I try to make my classes as interactive as possible, so I really enjoy the contributions the students bring to the class. Sometimes we take a right-turn (or was it a left-turn?!) during discussion because of a topic that comes up. This is the great thing about my seminars...I try to build in flexibility so we can address topics that come up during class. Finally, I enjoy having students from different backgrounds in one class. I don't have all bio majors, or all comm majors, or all poli sci or all business majors. When you have diverse backgrounds in the class, you have diverse discussion.

What is the most difficult part of teaching an Honors Seminar?

I tend to do a different seminar every year, and it's usually a class I've never taught before, so it means the material is at least somewhat new to me as well! I'm frantically trying to keep just one step ahead of the students. (I probably shouldn't admit that...)

Which has been your favorite Honors Seminar?

Ugh! Impossible to answer. I REALLY enjoyed going to DC for the Malarkey on the Mall class. I would love to do another travel seminar. I also loved the Ethics in Film class because we got to watch movies and apply ethical theories to the media (I should do that class again soon!) My current class Science and Pop Culture is fun because we're tweeting about science (even though the students were dragged kicking-and-screaming into the Twittersphere!) and looking at how new media affects how science communication is done. I can think of good things from every seminar I've done. 🕸

WORLD SCHOLARS PROGRAM COMPETITION

Announcing the spring competition for World Scholars funding to support a semester or year of study abroad in 2014-2015.

The World Scholars Program provides select undergraduate students with up to \$8,000 of funding to support a significant study experience in a country or region of the world whose principal language is not English. Applicants must be actively committed to achieving fluency in the language of that country or region. They must also be declared majors or minors in any of the non-language disciplines offered at the University of Louisville and endeavor, to the degree possible, to study the material of that discipline while abroad (whether through full-immersion coursework, service learning, internship placement, directed study, etc.). Students studying any of the modern languages offered at the University of Louisville (Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Hebrew, Italian, Japanese, Portuguese, Russian, and Spanish) are encouraged to apply. **Application deadline:** *March 27, 2014.*

- 1. Review application requirements at http://louisville.edu/artsandsciences/student/world-scholars to be sure you're eligible.
- 2. Make an appointment with Virginia Hosono, associate director of Study Abroad and International Affairs (vlhoso01@louisville.edu), to explore study abroad options that meet the requirements of the program.
- 3. Line up your letters of recommendation and language evaluation. (Forms included in the application packet.)

HONORS STUDENT WINS TOP CAMBRIDGE PRIZE

Patrick McClure, a 2013 graduate from the J.B. Speed School of Engineering and a former UofL Honors student, recently received the prestigious **Cambridge International Scholarship**, which is the University of Cambridge's top award for international students. Awarded each year to approximately 80 students who plan to earn a doctoral degree, the scholarship is valued at more than \$230,000. Patrick will use this scholarship to complete a **PhD in Cognition and Brain Sciences** where he hopes to create a Computer Aided Diagnostic (CAD) system to assist in the early detection of autism.

A native of Corbin, KY, Patrick came to UofL in 2009 as a Trustees Scholar to study bioengineering. He quickly established himself as a top academic performer, earning research assistantships and internships at **Johns Hopkins University** and the **Boston Scientific Corporation**. In 2012, Patrick earned the **Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship**, which is a \$7,500 scholarship, awarded to top STEM students across the nation possessing aptitude for research. He has presented his work on medical imaging and computer vision at international conferences in France, Spain, and Canada. In 2013 he graduated as the top bioengineering student in his class, earning the **Jerry and Pat Sturgen Award**.



Outside of his research, Patrick enjoys tutoring in math at local high schools, libraries, and community centers, where he helps youths and adults earn their GED. Currently, Patrick is completing an M.S. in Computer Science here at UofL before leaving for Cambridge in the fall. Congratulations Patrick for such a tremendous achievement and good luck at Cambridge!

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IRVIN F. AND ALICE S. ETSCORN INTERNATIONAL SUMMER Research awards

This in an exciting opportunity for undergraduates that will allow UofL students to study and conduct research overseas this coming summer. These awards are open to students from all disciplines. To be eligible to receive the funding, students must be able to demonstrate plans for continued enrollment at UofL in fall 2014. Students are responsible for creating their own proposed summer plan. Past recipients have conducted independent research, taken specialized courses in their field, completed professional internships, or undertaken intensive study at overseas language institutes.

Awards will be offered in increments from \$2,500 to \$5,000, depending upon the cost of the program and the student's level of funding from other sources. Applicants need to propose a preferred and alternate program and budgets for both (unless the student has already been accepted into the preferred program). Application Process:

- 1. Complete the application and essay (contact Emily Maiden for application).
- 2. Attach a one to two-paged resume.
- 3. Request official transcripts for all college-level work completed at any university or study abroad program.
- 4. Request letters of recommendation from two faculty members (i.e. professors), directed to your specific summer plan of study abroad and how it will fit into your overall undergraduate plan, enhancing your academic profile.

Application Timeline:

Monday, March 17, 2012:	By this date you should communicate which programs you are considering by email to Dr. Condon (CC Emily). Please include in this note your major, minor and year toward your degree.
Monday, March 31, 2012:	Deadline for submission of all hardcopy application materials; submit to Emily Maiden in the Overseers Honors House.
Friday, April 11, 2014:	From the pool of submitted applications, the most competitive candidates will be invited to interview on this date.

Selected Student Profile:

- Proposed program is intense and academically rigorous and at least three weeks long.
- Intent to apply for prestigious national scholarships (ex: Goldwater, Fulbright, Marshall, Mitchell, Boren, NSF), with this summer program as a significant step toward future goals.
- Chosen course of study is something beyond what is available at UofL.
- Cost of program is reasonable relative to the length of the program.
- Ability to receive course credit from UofL for your proposed activity.

- Applicants need to be available to begin GSA responsibilities August 11, 2014 and be able to continue these responsibilities through the last Friday in May, 2015.


CONGRESSIONAL SUMMER INTERNSHIPS
