OLIVIA SAILOR: 2012 BOOK AND MEDIA SALE

My first experience with BAMS started with former president Greg "Puma" Shaw and former vice president John "Jaguar" Guardiola. I was only a social chair then, dreaming of better events to create and students to invite. Little did I know that one day I too would be obsessed with filling up the Secret Room, plotting ways to find more books. Then the sale was a fever dream, perpetuated by the enthusiasm and perhaps madness of the stalwart pair. To everyone's surprise and delight, the sale was a hit, bringing in hundreds of customers and raising a tremendous amount of money.

Two years later, I found myself in Luke's office, nodding in agreement to bring what we now call BAMS to life. While the Council eventually went on to raise over \$ 10,000 for the hospital, it wasn't without a lot of heavy lifting, both literal and metaphorical. Two years is just enough time to forget the sheer amount of items that towered in the Secret Room, the volunteers needed to set up and break down, the nail biting anxiety that you wouldn't get enough books and records to sell. It was truly an exhausting group effort. But it was worth it for that trip to the hospital. It's one thing to hit the \$10,000 goal. It's a completely different type of satisfaction to go to the hospital and see how that translates into helping sick children. You can't put a price on a child's good health.

In the long run, BAMS was a test of endurance, patience, and teamwork. I learned a lot about the council and about myself. It's life affirming to see how much support the community will show you. When you're feeling frustrated or exhausted or sneezing from all the dust in the secret room, just remember – you're doing it for the kids. 🌣

HONORS ADVISING SIGNUPS

Attention Honors students: If you have not yet already signed up for advising, make sure to do so immediately!

Do I need an appointment with an Honors Advisor?

Only the following students *must* make appointments with an Honors advisor:

- All HON 101 students.
- All incoming Fall 2013 Honors freshmen enrolled in the College of Arts & Sciences with fewer than 24 hours earned (not including Fall 2013 classes).
- Any current Honors student or Honors Scholar who wishes to take an Honors class or Scholars Seminar in Spring 2014.

The following students are *not required* to see an Honors advisor:

- Students not currently on Good Standing (or Probation) within Honors or Honors Scholars.
- Honors students (excluding HON 101 students and incoming Fall 2013 A&S freshmen) who do not wish to take an Honors class or Scholars Seminar in Spring 2014.
- Honors students and Honors Scholars planning to graduate by December 2013.

After a couple electronic complications, all Honors students should have received an email from GradesFirst allowing them to sign up for Honors advising appointments. Appointments will begin Monday, September 9 and continue until Wednesday, October 30. **Priority registration begins Friday, November 1 at 8:00 AM.**


DAIRY KASTLE OUTING

RED BARN SCHOLARSHIPS

The *Florence M. Strickler Endowment* is in honor of the wife of Dr. Woodrow M. Strickler, the President of the University of Louisville during the founding of the Red Barn in 1969, who is affectionately known as the "First Lady of the Red Barn". Each year, four \$400 scholarships are awarded.

The *Torchbearer Endowment* was created through the efforts of Dr. Dennis C. Golden, who served as Vice-President of the University of Louisville. Four \$400 scholarships are awarded annually through this endowment.

The *Essie Jenkins Torchbearer Endowment* was established in 1999 through the Torchbearer Program. Beginning with the 2008 Spring Semester, one \$400 scholarship will be awarded in her honor.

The *Bridgette Pregliasco Torchbearer Endowment* honors Dr. Bridgette Pregliasco, Assistant Vice President for Student Life from 1995 to 2002, and was established in 2001 through the Torchbearer Program to provide financial resources for adult students. Four \$300 scholarships are granted through the ACCESS Office,

(The Caring Of New students Experiencing College Transitions) Peer Mentoring Program is to provide an avenue for student support through peer mentoring and advising for the encouragement of academic and social interactions, while promoting a unified community for Black students.

Qualifications:

- Currently enrolled at the University of Louisville
- Enrolled for 12 credit hours or more, with a minimum of 24 credit hours completed by Fall 2014
- Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5 by Fall 2014
- Must be seeking first undergraduate degree

Responsibilities:

- Completion of Mentor-in-Training Program during Spring 2014:
 - 1. Successful completion of Pan-African Studies 333
 - 2. Help implement African American Recognition Reception (March 25, 2014)
 - 3. Attend a minimum of two spring semester staff meetings
 - 4. Participate in Spring Kickoff (April 22, 2014)
- Completion of Peer Training and retreat (August 18 23, 2014)
- Maintain a minimum of six (6) and a maximum of ten (10) hours per week
- Document contacts with your assigned mentees
- Refer students to appropriate resource(s)
- Conduct follow-up e-mails/telephone calls from referral(s)
- Conduct monthly one-on-one sessions (individual or small group) with mentees


