FEATURE ARTICLE

EMILY MAIDEN: Celebrating 11 Years of Fulbright

With October almost in our rearview mirror, I am happy to say that it's already shaping up to be another great year in the Office of National and International Scholarship Opportunities. For 11 years now, Dr. Patricia Condon, Fulbright Program Advisor, has led the UofL Fulbright charge! Early last week we finalized an impressive 28 applications. Our candidate pool represents graduating seniors, graduate and professional students, and alumni across the University—from medical biology to musicology. The applications are for 20 countries on five continents, including Spain, Mongolia, Brazil, Norway, Tanzania, Korea, and Croatia.

As any of our candidates can attest, the Fulbright application process is a grueling mental marathon and only the fittest of the fit cross the finish line. However, thanks to our Office, you don't have to be alone for a single step of the journey. Under the leadership of Dr. Condon, we provide workshops, application examples, faculty mentorship, and a stringent final review process-- all designed to make your application the absolute BEST it can be! We congratulate all our candidates for submitting strong applications and look forward to hearing the initial results from the National Review Committee in January.

Aside from Fulbright, this fall our Office was proud to support candidates for THREE of the 'Big Brit' Scholarships. UofL's Rhodes candidate is Clayton Coleman, a former UofL swimmer who is currently serving as a Fulbright ETA in Cyprus. Two Honors students have applied for the Marshall Scholarship, which provides two years of funding for graduate programs in the U.K.—Patrick McClure and Brittany Hubert. Finally, Patrick is reprising his role as a Gates-Cambridge Scholarship candidate; this year he hopes to bring home PhD funding as his prize. We should know the preliminary results of these competitions soon.

NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

CRITICAL LANGUAGE SCHOLARSHIP

The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) is a summer-only scholarship designed to provide students in all disciplines with the opportunity to study critical languages in countries of national security interest to the U.S. State Department. There is a limited list of languages available and not all languages can be studied at all levels.

Here is the breakdown of possible languages:

- Azerbaijani, Bangla/Bengali, Hindi, Indonesian, Korean, Punjabi, Turkish, and Urdu: Beginning, advanced beginning, intermediate and advanced levels;
- Arabic and Persian: Advanced beginning, intermediate and advanced levels;
- Chinese, Japanese, and Russian: Intermediate and advanced levels.

NOTE: You do NOT need our institutional endorsement to apply for this scholarship, but we are happy to help you through the process. We can share essay examples and help you edit your materials.

The *Florence M. Strickler Endowment* is in honor of the wife of Dr. Woodrow M. Strickler, the President of the University of Louisville during the founding of the Red Barn in 1969, who is affectionately known as the "First Lady of the Red Barn".

The *Torchbearer Endowment* was created through the efforts of Dr. Dennis C. Golden, who served as Vice-President of the University of Louisville. Four \$400 scholarships are awarded annually through this endowment.

The *Essie Jenkins Torchbearer Endowment* was established in 1999 through the Torchbearer Program. Beginning with the 2008 Spring Semester, one \$400 scholarship will be awarded in her honor.

The *Bridgette Pregliasco Torchbearer Endowment* honors Dr. Bridgette Pregliasco, Assistant Vice President for Student Life from 1995 to 2002, and was established in 2001 through the Torchbearer Program to provide financial resources for adult students. Four \$300 scholarships are granted through the ACCESS Office,


