HONORS NEWS M.A.S.S. BOOK AND SUPPLY SCHOLARSHIP

Students with demonstrable financial need and involvement in the University Honors Program may apply for awards to buy books and supplies for spring semester classes. HONORS PEER ADVISOR POSITIONS

Are you interested in working for Honors next summer as an orientation peer advisor? Do you want to help mentor next year's incoming freshmen class and help them create an academic plan for fall 2014? Peer advisors will be trained to help next year's incoming Honors freshmen class as they develop an academic plan and schedule courses during summer orientation. This is an outstanding opportunity for Honors students to learn more about the University, discuss their experiences in the University Honors Program with interested new students and parents, and earn some money along the way. Students will be expected to work approximately 15-20 hours each week from mid-May through the end of June 2014.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Both the Summer Research Opportunity Program (SROP) and Summer Term II classes may conflict with the required work schedule for a Peer Advisor. Please take this into consideration when applying for the Peer Advisor position. Additionally, if you are planning a summer travel abroad experience, you will want to check with Honors to determine if potential conflicts will prevent you from participating as a peer advisor.

Applications are due at **4:00** *PM on January* **17**, **2014**. In order to apply you must have completed at least 30 hours and have a 3.35 or higher cumulative GPA. You may bring the completed application to the Etscorn Honors Center or email it to Luke "LeRoy" Buckman at luke.buckman@louisville.edu.

HONORSINEWS PROVOST'S AWARD FOR EXEMPLARY ADVISING

If you feel that your Honors advisor, departmental faculty advisor, or another advisor with whom you've worked is a good candidate for this year's exemplary advising award, please consider nominating them. Information on the award and a nomination link are now available online at http://louisville.edu/advising/award.

A.) Completion of the online nomination and support letter form to illustrate the nominee's outstanding professional characteristics. Such evidence may include:

- Effective interpersonal skills.
- Meeting advisees in settings outside of the office.
- Mastery of institutional regulations and policies.
- Mastery and utilization of appropriate informational and referral sources.
- Participation in and support of intrusive advising to build strong relationships with advisees.
- Commitment to integration of academic advising with career and life planning goals.
- Commitment to accessibility of advisor to advisees and frequency of contact with advisees.
- Making a major contribution to the improvement of quality of academic advising.
- Embracing a teaching and learning model of advising.
- Advocating for students.
- Supporting university-wide and unit-specific advising initiatives, especially those that are designed to help the university improve student retention.

B.) A minimum of 3 online letters of support (from faculty, staff, or students-letters from students are strongly encouraged) recommending the advisor for nomination are required for the advisor to be considered a nominee, and become eligible to receive the award. These support letters should provide clear examples of the nominee's exemplary performance.

Applications are still open for the 2014 Thomas R. Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowships competitions, including both the Pickering Foreign Affairs Fellowship (for college juniors; deadline of *January 24*) and the Pickering Graduate Foreign Affairs Fellowship (for graduating seniors or college graduates; deadline of *February 7*).

The Pickering Fellowships help talented students--highly motivated and academically excellent college juniors and graduating seniors or college graduates--who want to pursue a Foreign Service career in the U.S. Department of State. The programs provide funding for academic expenses, as well as summer internships, professional development, and ongoing mentoring.

The *Florence M. Strickler Endowment* is in honor of the wife of Dr. Woodrow M. Strickler, the President of the University of Louisville during the founding of the Red Barn in 1969, who is affectionately known as the "First Lady of the Red Barn".

The *Torchbearer Endowment* was created through the efforts of Dr. Dennis C. Golden, who served as Vice-President of the University of Louisville. Four \$400 scholarships are awarded annually through this endowment.

The *Essie Jenkins Torchbearer Endowment* was established in 1999 through the Torchbearer Program. Beginning with the 2008 Spring Semester, one \$400 scholarship will be awarded in her honor.

The *Bridgette Pregliasco Torchbearer Endowment* honors Dr. Bridgette Pregliasco, Assistant Vice President for Student Life from 1995 to 2002, and was established in 2001 through the Torchbearer Program to provide financial resources for adult students. FROMOURFERIENDS UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH SCHOLAR GRANT

The primary purpose of an Undergraduate Research Scholar (URS) is to enrich the research, scholarship and creative arts experience of the undergraduate student by involving the student in research collaboration with a faculty mentor. The student is expected to become intellectually involved in design and execution of the research project, not just serve as "another pair of hands." The undergraduate student writes the URS proposal after he/she has identified a faculty mentor who is interested in serving as the mentor. The faculty mentor is expected to make arrangements for the student to receive up to three (3) hours of course credit for the research or creative activity and provide a grade for the work completed by the student.

Students are encouraged to present a poster, or an equivalent demonstration of the research, on the Undergraduate Research Day. The student may request up to \$300 (dry lab/creative activity) or \$500 (wet lab) for supplies and expenses required for conducting the research or creative activity. **URS proposals may be submitted at any time.** They will be reviewed on a monthly basis.
