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FEATURE ARTICLE

Faculty Focus: Dr. John Hale

In the last issue of *The Current*, the Honors Program requested that students, staff, or faculty members send in their nominations for an ongoing feature, The Faculty Focus. We are proud to feature our first nominee, Dr. John Hale, Director of the Liberal Studies Program at UofL. Dr. Hale is currently teaching the Honors Scholar Seminar “Archaeology of Sacred Sites.” Previously, Dr. Hale has taught Honors Seminars in fall 2007 (“Archaeology of Ancient Greece & Rome”) and fall 2011 (“Archaeology of Ancient Greece”), the latter of which concluded with a 12-day field experience. This experience provided an opportunity for the students in the seminar to visit numerous sites that had been the topic of study, discussion, and presentations throughout the semester. Dr. Hale’s Honors seminars on archaeology have been student favorites and, from his responses in our interview, it looks like there is another seminar idea in development! Following his for this week’s issue of *The Faculty Focus*, Honors sent him a list of questions to answer about his experience working with the Honors Program:

1. What do you like about teaching in the Honors Program?

Teaching seminars in the Honors Program enables me to create here on our UofL campus the same teaching experience that I enjoy with students during fieldwork on archaeological sites. Whether we are digging on a terrestrial site such as Greek temple or a Roman villa, or diving on a sunken shipwreck or a submerged ceremonial center, undergraduate students are almost always part of the team. So we divide our time between the actual mapping, excavation, and collecting of data on the one hand, and working with the students in small groups to discuss the finds of the day – what they tell us about the ancient people; why they matter; and how we should interpret them. It’s that same mix of intense research, personal involvement, and group discussion that I find in the UofL Honors seminars.

2. How does your teaching style differ between Honors Seminars and regular lecture courses?

In Honors seminars, students become partners in presenting information and seeking answers to critical research questions, some of which have puzzled scholars for centuries. During the time we spend together, we can go beyond the textbooks and delve deeply into enduring questions about the human past. In Honors seminars I try to emphasize the interdisciplinary nature of scientific research, and the importance of documenting one's own discoveries and giving full credit to the discoveries of others.

3. What was it like to travel in Greece with students from the Honors Seminar on “The Archaeology of Ancient Greece?” Why is travel important to learning?

As with all scientific research, there's much more to archaeology than can be compressed into a classroom on campus. Archaeology is the science (and “SCIENCE” just means “A WAY OF KNOWING”) of reconstructing the human past NOT from writings – that's “History” – but from material remains that our ancestors left behind. Archaeologists are the CSI teams of human antiquity. We go into the field to collect the data, ranging from artifacts and structures to the organic remains of animal bones, plant pollen, or human DNA. Later, these will be brought back to the lab for intensive analysis and interpretation. When Honors students visit the places they have been studying, they are in fact carrying out the first essential step in this scientific process: collecting data, and understanding the geographical context in which the data are preserved. Every field trip we take is a unique voyage of discovery!

4. Are you currently developing any new ideas for a potential Honors Seminar?

For my next Honors seminar I am designing a new course called “The Origins of Science: Ancient Astronomy, Engineering, and Medicine.” It's my belief that we still have a lot to learn from the great scientific minds and achievements of the past. In the time of our ancestors, “Science” was not a cluster of separate subjects with labels like “Biology” or “Mathematics,” but a holistic pursuit of new knowledge and understanding. I would like to try to recapture the excitement of that ancient interdisciplinary quest.

Honors Advising

As you all are probably well-aware, Priority Registration is right around the corner! We in Honors Advising are happy to help you through this experience, whether it's your first time around or you are a highly-experienced registrant, we hope that the following tips will help to alleviate your anxieties and ensure a successful registration experience for Spring 2015:

- Priority registration begins at **8AM on Thursday, Nov. 6**. We recommend that you go ahead and fill your shopping carts on ULink with your specific course selections for Spring 2015 now so that you can be ready to just click the "Submit" button bright an early on 11/6. We recommend using the Online Schedule of Classes in tandem with your ULink Shopping Cart to figure out your day and time options
- Please consider using the Planning area of your Shopping Cart to "validate" your courses in advance of registration. This way, you have some time to investigate error messages before the day of registration.
- Please log in to ULink and navigate to your "Student Center" under the "Student Services" tab to check to see if you have any registration holds on your account before Nov. 6. Not all holds are advising-related, so please read them carefully to find out which office can best help you to address these. If you need assistance addressing these holds or interpreting the reason for them, please contact your advisor or the Etscorn Honors Center at **502-852-6293**.
- If you have already been in for an Honors Advising appointment this semester, and you just have a quick question to address related to registration, or if you wish to rearrange your Honors course selections, please feel free to come to Walk-In Advising in the Etscorn Honors Center from **8:30-11:30AM** or from **1-4PM on Wednesday, Nov. 5** or the day of priority registration, **Thursday, Nov. 6**.
- If you have yet to see an Honors advisor this semester, we want to give you the time and attention that you deserve during your advising experience, so we ask that you please contact the front desk of the Etscorn Honors Center at **502-852-6293** to set up an appointment for after the registration period. Please note that these appointments will begin the week of **Nov. 17**.

Provost's Awards for Exemplary Advising

If you feel that your Honors, Departmental, or any other advisor that you have worked with would be a good candidate for this year's exemplary advising award, please consider nominating! Information on the award and the nomination process can be found at <https://louisville.edu/advising/awards/>

There will be two categories for nominations:

- Full-Time Faculty Member, whose primary advising responsibility is advising undergraduate students
- Full-Time Professional Staff Academic Advisor, whose current and primary job responsibilities must be assigned to the academic advisement of undergraduate students AND who hold the University of Louisville Master Advisor Certificate (MAC).

*Past recipients of the award may be nominated, but they will not be considered for selection if they have received the award in the past five years.

2014-2015 Nomination Procedure & Letters of Support

- All nominations must include a letter of support from the nominator and 3-5 additional letters of support from faculty, staff, or students.
- The nomination/support letter form must be completed online.
- The deadline for submitting the nomination/support letter form is **Friday, November 21, 2014**.
- Three to five online nomination/letters of support must be submitted by **Friday, November 21, 2014**.

The online letters of support should provide clear examples of the nominee's exemplary performance. The letters of support should be from faculty, staff and students (letters from students are strongly encouraged).

NOTE: It is the responsibility of the nominator to solicit 3-5 letters of support and ensure they are submitted by the deadline published.

Recognition

The names of the award recipients will be announced during the spring semester. These individuals will receive a paid trip to the 2015 National Academic Advising Association (NACADA) annual meeting. In addition, a gift to recognize the nominees and the award recipients will be presented at a reception held by Provost Willihnganz to honor the award recipients. The reception is being planned for April 2015. Specific details will be posted as they become available.

NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS



Announcing the Critical Language Scholarship [All Disciplines, All Levels]

The Critical Language Scholarship (CLS) is a summer-only scholarship designed to provide students with the opportunity to study critical languages in countries of national security interest to the U.S. State Department. The following languages are eligible for study:

- Azerbaijani, Bangla/Bengali, Hindi, Indonesian, Korean, Punjabi, Turkish, and Urdu: Beginning, advanced beginning, intermediate and advanced levels;
- Arabic and Persian: Advanced beginning, intermediate and advanced levels;
- Chinese, Japanese, and Russian: Intermediate and advanced levels.

NOTE: You do NOT need our institutional endorsement to apply for this scholarship. The application consists of a few short answer questions, and we are happy to help you edit and revise your answers.

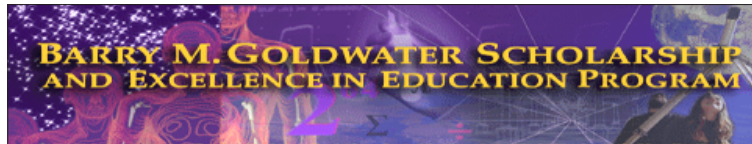



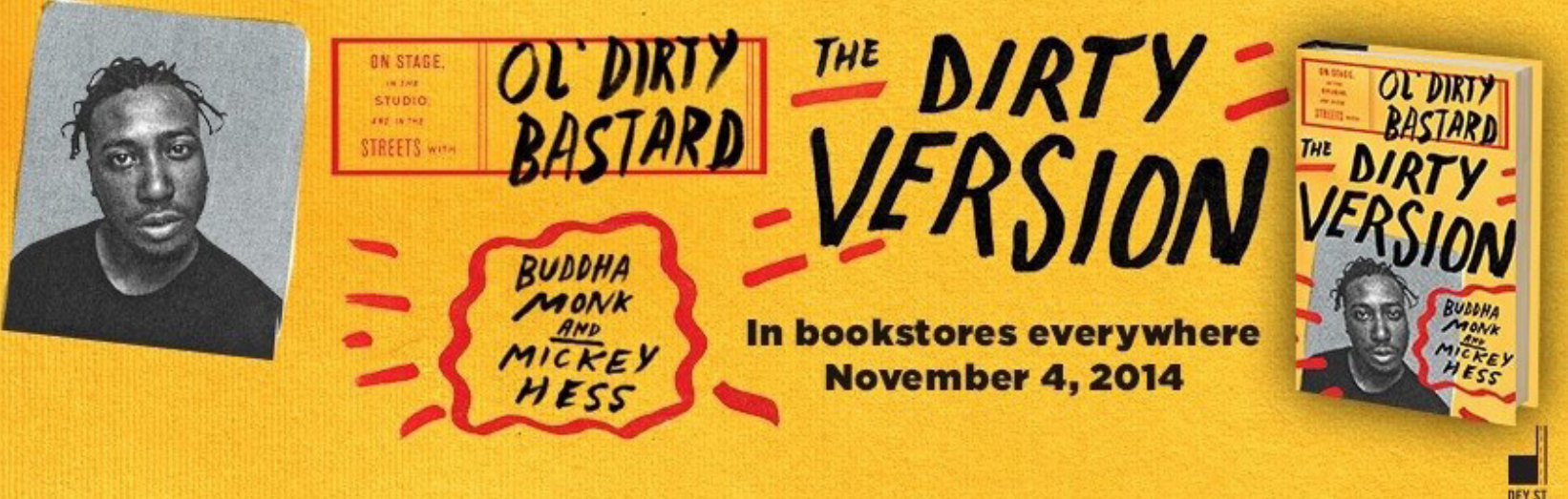


Leadership and Team-building Event

Writing the Dirty Version: The Uncensored Story of Professors and Rappers



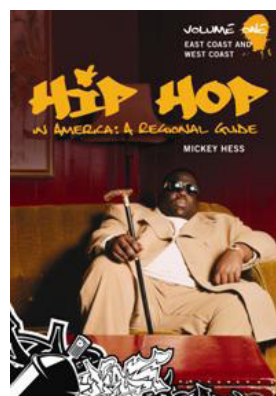
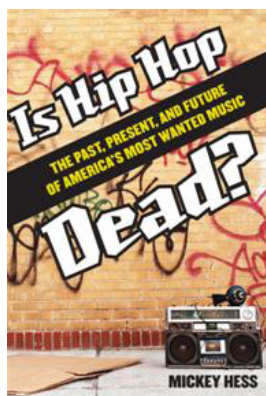
Mickey Hess is a Professor of English at Rider University and the co-author (with Buddha Monk) of *The Dirty Version: On Stage, in the Studio, and in the Streets with Ol' Dirty Bastard* (HarperCollins, 2014). He is the author of *Big Wheel at the Cracker Factory* and *Is Hip-Hop Dead? The Past, Present, and Future of America's Most Wanted Music*, and the editor of Greenwood Press's *Icons of Hip-Hop* and *Hip Hop in America: A Regional Guide*.

"Writing *The Dirty Version: The Uncensored Story of Professors and Rappers*," takes the reader behind the scenes to explore the sometimes uneasy translation of hip-hop onto library shelves and into college

classrooms. From the failed attempts of others to tell Dirty's story, to the fights Buddha and I had about how best to tell it, my article wrestles with the question of who will tell hip-hop's story and what will get lost in translation.



My name is Rachel Quick, and I work in our Dental Student Affairs Office here at the University of Louisville's School of Dentistry.
