

Rhodes Scholar Program

One to three years of study leading to a degree at Oxford University, England. Rhodes Scholars are chosen not only for their outstanding scholarly achievements, but for their character, commitment to others and to the common good, and for their potential for leadership in whatever domains their careers may lead. Seniors, alumni, graduate or professional students are eligible to apply. Rhodes also has an exciting new initiative that involves students pursuing a second bachelors' degree at Oxford. Candidates must be U.S. citizens no older than 23 when applying.

Marshall Scholarship

MARSHALL SCHOLARSHIPS

One to three years of study leading to a degree at any British university. Seniors, graduate and professional students, and alumni are eligible to apply within two years of their undergraduate graduation. Candidates must be U.S. citizens with an undergraduate GPA of at least 3.7. Up to 40 scholars are selected each year to study at the graduate level at a UK institution in any field of study. The benefit of this award is that it opens up the possibility of all top universities in Great Britain, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland. George J. Mitchell Scholarship

One year of graduate study in any discipline in the Republic of Ireland (but NOT in Northern Ireland for the 2016-2017 academic year), with extensive programming to connect young leaders from the U.S. to the island of Ireland, while recognizing intellectual achievement, leadership, and a commitment to public service. Seniors, graduate and professional students, and alumni are eligible to apply. Must be under the age of 30 and a U.S. citizen. Gates-Cambridge Scholarship

Cambridge

One to four years of study leading to a degree at Cambridge University, England. Seniors, graduate and professional students, and alumni are eligible to apply. U.S. and non-U.S. citizens are eligible. One thing that sets the Gates-Cambridge is that all applicants must initiate the process by applying directly to their intended department at Cambridge and filling out a supplemental portion of the Cambridge application form to be considered for the fellowship. Though she broke my heart (the American Dream is a dirty trick?!), she was also the first to give me some vocabulary and new lenses to analyze media texts. Related to the last question above, her course took things I had learned as a small child to another level. My roommates and friends hated me because I would start analyzing movies, TV shows, music, etc. And most of them were pre-med, so they weren't in the mood. At all.

Advice for students:

I would tell any student to **enjoy** themselves, at whatever level they are on. You never get those years back. And I had an awesome time at each one of my schools. But, it really goes by quickly. **Savor the Flavor**.

GLYPTUSANN GRIDER JONES "Glypie"

What was your path after graduation?

After spending a year in Jejudo, South Korea, through the Fulbright English Teaching Program, I earned a master's degree in political science from Miami University of Ohio. I have worked in UofL's McConnell Center for five years and am presently a doctoral candidate in UofL's Department of Urban and Public Affairs. My research is focused on the intersection of charter school formation and sub-state secession.

What do you remember the most from your Fulbright experience?

As a Fulbright ETA, I taught English conversation to 340 students at Hallim Girls' Middle School in a rural South Korean fishing village. I will always treasure the 13 months of memories and friendships from the Fulbright experience. From earning my black belt in Taekwondo to playing pick-up soccer with my students, I felt welcomed to a new country and way of life. Though my formal position was an English teacher, I used the opportunity to be a cultural ambassador and student. I spent a week in a Buddhist monastery, interned in the U.S. Embassy and used every moment to expand my knowledge of Korean politics, gender dynamics, religion and even food. (I'm still trying to master my host mother's kimchi jjigae recipe.) I was also able to travel more extensively in the region to North Korea, Sin-

gapore, Thailand and Japan. My day-trip to Kaesong, North Korea, was the embodiment of George Orwell's writings – readings I engaged directly in Dr. Slavin's Honors course on "The Politics of George Orwell."

To students interested in Fulbright: Fulbright allows your undergraduate studies and coursework to come to life – and you have the added bonus of getting paid to do it. Apply. There's a reason we're among the highest-producing Fulbright institutions in the state and the nation. We have great faculty and staff support, and so many people believe you are qualified to compete at this level. The first step is to apply.

How did the Honors Program enhance your undergraduate experience?

UofL's Honors Program was one of the highlights of my undergraduate experience: it offered challenging and unique classes, great peer interactions and the opportunity to travel internationally. Raised in a small Kentucky town, I immediately felt at home with Honors' emphasis on small classes and developing tight-knit communities centered on intellectual and personal development and community service. The Socratic-style seminars and focus on interdisciplinary learning were precursors to my graduate school experience and are one of the reasons I sought an interdisciplinary doctoral program.

What is your favorite Honors memory?

My first international trip was through the Honors Program – an excursion to Italy, England and Scotland examining the "Roots of the Republic" led by Dr. Gary Gregg – now my boss. I drank my first espresso, gazed in awe at the Sistine Chapel, discovered that the site of Julius Caesar's assassination is now a cat sanctuary, shadowed a Scottish MP and watched a play at Shakespeare's Globe Theater. These are opportunities I would never have been able to pursue on my own. Sharing the trip with Honors students – many in other academic disciplines – was a truly global and broadening experience.
