CORN SCHOLARSHIP APPLICAT

Applications for academic scholarships with a value of up to \$5,000 for the 2016-2017 academic year are now available. Out-of-state students are eligible to apply. The application and its criteria, along with instructions, may be accessed through the Scholarships page on our website: http://bit.ly/1Y1INnP These scholarships are funded through the generous donations by the Etscorn Foundation. Completed online applications, including all letters of recommendation, are due by Friday April 15, 2016 by 4:00 PM.

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Eligibility

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To be eligible for this scholarship, a student must:

- have completed 24 credit hours at UofL
- be enrolled full-time or part time at UofL be planning to enroll full-time for at least Fall semester of the 2016-2017 academic year
- be pursuing his/her first undergraduate degree
- have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.35 (including UofL courses, transfer work, and repeat grades)
- not hold another full-tuition scholarship

Requirements

Scholarship awards will be based on the strength of the student's

- Transcript
- Personal Statement
- Honors Curricular and Extracurricular Record
- Two Letters of Recommendation

KURZ DEADLINE NEXT WEEK - MARCH 28

IT'S ALMOST TIME TO REGISTER! As you all are probably well-aware, Priority Registration is right around the corner! We in Honors Advising are happy to help you through it, whether it's your first time around or you are a highly-experienced registrant, we hope that the following tips will help to alleviate your anxieties and ensure a successful registration experience for Fall 2016:

Priority registration begins at 8:00 AM on Tuesday, March 29. We recommend that you go ahead and **fill your shopping carts on ULink** with your specific course selections for Fall 2016 now, so that you can be ready to just click the "Submit" button bright and early on 3/29. Try using the Online Schedule of Classes in tandem with your ULink Shopping Cart to figure out your day and time options (a link to the aphedule of classes in tandem with your ULink Shopping Cart to figure out your day and time options (a link to the schedule of classes is in the Advising Tool Kit below.)

Please consider "validating" your courses prior to registration using the Planning area of your Shopping Cart. This way, you have some time to investigate error messages before the day of registration.



To avoid delaying registration, check for any registration holds on your account. Log into ULink and navigate to your "Student Center" under the "Student Services" tab to do this. Not all holds are advising-related, so please read them carefully to find out which office can best help you to address these. If you need assistance addressing these holds or interpreting the reason for them, please contact your advisor or the Etscorn Honors Center at 502-852-6293.

If our advertising efforts have served their purpose, then you've probably heard of the Book and Media Sale, put on by Honors Student Council to benefit Camp Quality Kentuckiana. With any luck, you could have even donated some items to our cause (thanks a bunch, by the way). What you may not have heard about is the human element of BAMS. Through working with BAMS, I have been discovering the answer to one question over this past year: why do we bother?

I have been lucky enough to be part of the sale's development this season as the Vice President (VP) in charge of Item Management, and my committee and I have been organizing every donation that comes our way. I have been astounded and humbled by the generosity of the surrounding communities. Honors Student Council headquarters is currently packed from floor to ceiling with these donations. Moving through the space has been equated to rock climbing, and there have been nearly as many landslides. Additionally, we have over 12,000 items in storage under Threlkeld Hall, with more coming in every day.

Honors Student Council is so grateful for the mountains of donations that we have received. However, the sheer number of items has overwhelmed us at times. An aspect of the sorting process is moving donations to Threlkeld's basement. One day found two of us carrying over 3,000 items down a flight of stairs. The bottom of one box tore apart as we awkwardly hauled it across the basement. After standing ankle-deep in a pile of books, the two of us gathered ourselves and the books before carrying on. We both definitely skipped the gym that evening. Moving items can only happen after they have been sorted, which is a whole other can of worms. Much like mopping yourself into a corner cleaning your kitchen, there have been instances of accidental fortress building while sorting. In the fervor of sorting, I have looked up to realize that I was completely surrounded with no way out more than once. Having to extricate yourself from a fort children would envy is another exercise in the BAMS workout.

In the midst of sorting through all the donations, my fellow VPs and I have been shaping the course of the sale in multiple meetings every week; stressing over the best methods of getting the word out; arguing over the design of flyers, yard signs, banners, and bookmarks; and cheering, high-fiving and dancing for every goal we've realized. This sale has been a lesson in cooperation, compromise, determination, success, and even failure. And that's just what I've learned this year. I'm confident that my fellow VPs have learned their own lessons, as well.

None of what the VPs have accomplished this year would have come to fruition without the support of our first-year representatives. While I can't name them all here, they have been absolute rock-stars in dealing with whatever is thrown their way. From organizing book drives, to contacting businesses for donations, to



hosting their own bake sale, our first-year representatives have been phenomenal. Each of them was chosen to be a part of our committee because of their drive to give back to our community.

First-year representative, Angela Kiefer, said that she wanted to be a part of this event from the beginning, saying that "BAMS is a collaboration of bright individuals to rally the rest of campus, the entire Louisville community, and even surrounding states to come together with Camp Quality to weaken cancer's power. At its core, that's what it is. Yes, there are thousands of books and movies for sale, but the end goal is to make a child smile again." Angela's statement embodies the spirit and goals of BAMS: a commitment to make a difference in a child's life. Every single member of the BAMS committee, and Honors Student Council are committed to

this cause for that reason. For every one thousand dollars we raise, we send one child to Camp Quality for a week of living like any other kid should. On e thousand dollars lets a child, who has endured more than many of us ever will, swim, kayak, learn, dance, sing, and flat-out have fun.

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So while organizing the Book and Media Sale can be discouraging, disappointing, and feel like an all-around disaster at times, we continue because we know we will succeed. We do it all so we can contribute to an amazing organization that has helped ease some of the suffering in our community. So why do we bother? Because we care.

We as a Council are excited to share our efforts with you during the first week of April. The sale will be massive, filling the entire Red Barn with the donations we have so carefully sorted. The items that once made the walls of our forts will be available to you! (No mountain climbing experience necessary.) We can't wait to see you there, helping us help Camp Quality.




