Event Review: Medical School Spotlight

For the past ten years, Honors has partnered with the University of Louisville's Medical School to produce the Medical School Spotlight. Last week Dr. Stephen Wheeler, Pamela Osborne, and four Honors alumni (currently attending medical school) brought their knowledge and experience to address current students' most pressing questions. When asked about the event a current student, Kara Hubert, said, "The event was very informative and helpful in regards to better understanding the application process and medical school itself. Some of the most useful information was describing how the committee reviews applications; specifically, letters of recommendation, shadowing experience, and transcripts."

During the event John Guardiola (Biology), a fourth year medical student, spoke about his time researching at the NIEH. Ishita Jain (Bioengineering), a second year medical student, discussed her experiences with the pre-med curriculum as a Speed student and why she chose to do a master's program. Thwisha Joshi (French and Biology) and Matthew Smith (Spanish and Biology) represented the first year students. They talked about the adjustments and time commitments that come with medical school and the importance of using your undergraduate degree as an opportunity to explore who you are as a person. The group was able to discuss the best practices for preparing for medical school and how the admissions process actually works. Honors hopes attendees benefited from the event, and looks forward to hosting again next year!

Honors Peer Advisor Positions

Are you interested in working for Honors this summer? Consider becoming an Honors Peer Advisor! Peer Advisors will be trained to help incoming Honors freshmen as they develop an academic plan and schedule courses during summer orientation. This is an outstanding opportunity for Honors students to learn more about the University, discuss their experiences in the University Honors Program with interested new students and parents, and earn some money along the way. Students will be expected to work approximately 15-20 hours each week from mid-May through the beginning of July 2016.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Both the Summer Research Opportunity Program (SROP) and Summer Term II classes may conflict with the required work schedule for a Peer Advisor. Please take this into consideration when applying for the Peer Advisor position. Additionally, if you are planning a summer travel abroad experience, you will want to check with Honors to determine if potential conflicts will prevent you from participating as a peer advisor. Applications are due at 4:00 PM on January 15, 2016. In order to apply you must have completed at least 30 hours (by the end of the spring 2016 semester) and have a 3.35 or higher cumulative GPA. Get Ready to Register!

As you all are probably well-aware, Priority Registration is right around the corner! We in Honors Advising are happy to help you through it, whether it's your first time around or you are a highly-experienced registrant, we hope that the following tips will help to alleviate your anxieties and ensure a successful registration experience for Spring 2016:

Priority registration begins at 8:00 AM on Thursday, Nov. 5 We recommend that you go ahead and fill your shopping carts on ULink with your specific course selections for Spring 2016 now, so that you can be ready to just click the "Submit" button bright and early on 11/5. Try using the Online Schedule of Classes in tandem with your ULink Shopping Cart to figure out your day and time options (a link to the schedule of classes is in the Advising Tool Kit below.)

Please consider "validating" your courses prior to registration using the **Planning** area of your Shopping Cart. This way, you have some time to investigate error messages before the day of registration.



To avoid delaying registration, check for any registration holds on your account before Nov. 5. Log into ULink and navigate to your "Student Center" under the "Student Services" tab to do this. Not all holds are advising-related, so please read them carefully to find out which office can best help you to address these. If you need assistance addressing these holds or interpreting the reason for them, please contact your advisor or the Etscorn Honors Center at 502-852-6293.

Why did you join Honors?

I was very intimidated by UofL's large size as an incoming Freshman. I knew that college was going to be a big change, so I wanted to be in a supportive environment that would ease my transition. 




