SENIOR HONORS THESIS

If you are graduating in May 2017, the deadline to submit your Thesis Proposal is fast approaching! Successfully completing a Senior Honors Thesis through the College of Arts & Sciences is required to be eligible to graduate with Highest Honors (Summa Cum Laude).

Are you interested in or already pursuing undergraduate research in your field of interest? If so, and if you meet some minimum GPA and credit hours qualifications, you may be a good candidate to write a Senior Honors Thesis! 



THE 2016-2017 FULBRIGHT CYCL

Each fall we host a series of Workshops, culminating in a week of Campus Interviews that prepare our applicants to submit highly competitive applications for Academic Grants and English Teaching Assistantships (ETAs) to countries around the world. We are looking for graduating seniors, graduate students, and recent graduates and alumni (up to 5 years out) who intend to apply for the Fulbright this year. Below is our full schedule of events for the Fulbright fall competition cycle. Experience tells us that students who attend all events end up doing significantly better. You will note the deadlines will come fast and furious once the action starts!

Introducing the newest member of the Fulbright family:

Charles W. Leonard, Ph.D. the Executive Director of both the Grawemeyer Awards and the Grawemeyer Scholars Program will be working with this office during the 2016-2017 academic year facilitating the pursuit of Fulbright and other nationally competitive prestigious scholarships. He will be participating in Workshops I and II, meeting individually with Fulbright candidates in the week before the campus deadline, taking part in campus interviews, critiquing applications through all phases, and as co-chair of the Fulbright campus committee, helping Dr. Condon write the Campus Committee Evaluations of all candidates. His e-mail is Charlie.leonard@louisville. edu. His administrative assistant, Ms. Billye Potts, will also be lending her considerable talents to this year's Fulbright effort.

Fulbright Application Steps:

For anyone applying for a Fulbright through the Office of National and International Scholarships this year, don't forget the steps! Here is an overview:

Step One: Meeting with Dr. Condon One-on-One

Step Two: Attend the Sequence of Fulbright Application Workshops

Step Three: Prior to Campus Deadline, on Monday, September 12, Tuesday, September 13, or Wednesday, September 14, all on-campus candidates meet by prior appointment with Dr. Charles Leonard in

to go over your application paying particular attention to how all the parts have come together.

Step Four: Campus Deadline on Thursday, September 15

Step Five: Recommendation Deadline

Step Six: Campus Interviews: ETA candidates will be scheduled for a 30 minute interview; Full grant applicants

will be interviewed for 60 minutes. Interviews are now scheduled for Thursday, September 22nd; Friday, September 23rd; Monday, September 26th; Tuesday, September 27th; Wednesday, September 28th.

These dates have sessions grouped by the faculty expertise required to do each review.

Step Seven: Follow Up Meetings

Step Eight: Final Edits and Submission

Step Nine: The Waiting Game - each country or region makes their own final selections, so notification of the

ultimate award results may come any time from late March through June.


A Time for PEACC: Left Behind Wednesday, August 31 • 7:30 PM The Avenue, Cardinal Towne
