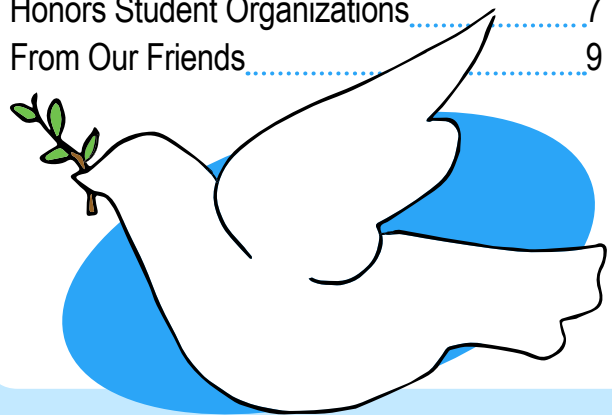

Course Description:

This course is about the signature traditional and popular music of the American Southeast through the beginning of commercial country music, especially that associated with the Appalachian region of Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky. The material will include ballads (both transplants from the British Isles and also more recent ones), “old time tunes” (from the early days of radio and recordings), and traditional bluegrass (from the original Bill Monroe and his Blue Grass Boys through about 1975). While we will spend time identifying, analyzing and placing examples of these types of music in a cultural context, we will also pay special attention to different ways that music relates to place, whether it’s a fiddle tune named for a geographical feature (“Shippingport”) or a ballad about something that took place in an actual place (“Baltimore Fire”) or a lyric that is anchored in a specific landscape (“East Virginia Blues”) or a more generic concept such as “region” (“Sweet Sunny South”), “home” (“Eight More Miles to Louisville”) or “heaven” (“Angel Band”). Then we will travel to some of the places that this music is about, or from which it comes. **This course will fulfill requirements in the Humanities or Social Sciences.**

The anticipated student cost for this travel is \$300 - \$350 per student. The final course fee will be determined by the end of October. The student fee will be charged to the student’s university account. Potential site locations include: Rosine, Whitesburg, Hindman, Pine Mountain Settlement School, Berea (all in Kentucky), Clinton and Bristol, TN, and Hiltons, VA.

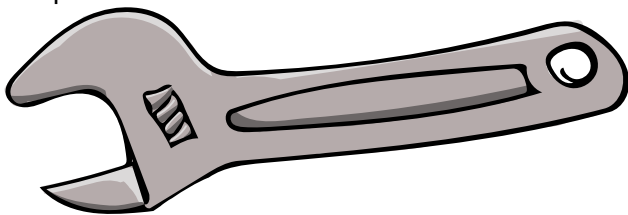

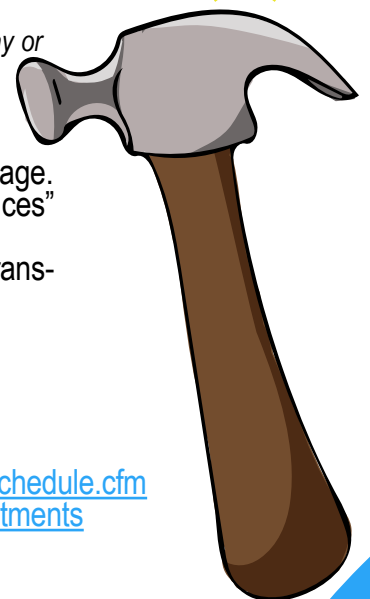

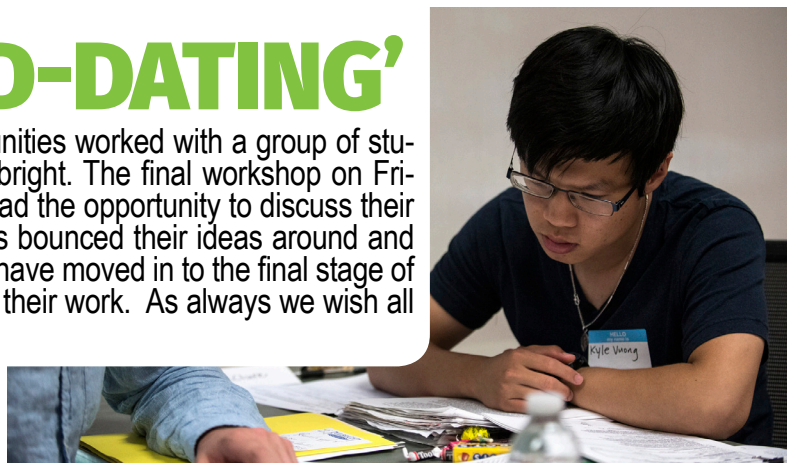

ANTS FOR RESEARCH

Ant-Man co-star, Evangeline Lilly, once said that “You could take all of [the actors] out of [Ant-Man] and it’d still be really kick ass if you had the ants.” Biology professor, Dr. Steve Yanoviak would likely agree. Earlier this month, he presented his research to the second year Honors Science Living Learning Community, explaining how amazing ants are. His research in Central and South America, while not uncovering any ant-themed superheroes, has found that some species of ants have incredibly super capabilities. For example, an ant can fall from the top of a tree where it was harvesting leaves, and land safely below. That, he explained, is perfectly normal for ants, simply because their tiny mass doesn’t allow enough force to build up to cause them damage upon impact.

More interesting though, are his findings about gliding ants, which orient themselves in mid-air to land on a nearby tree, rather than on the predator-infested ground below. Another ant species is very good at swimming, using each little leg to propel themselves through water which is infested with scavenger bugs who would attempt to eat them, and fish which would do the same. Dr. Yanoviak once witnessed an ant which was engulfed by a fish, only to rise to the surface in a moment and continue swimming; likely the ant tasted bad due to pheromones it released in distress. Ants also have a nifty knack of detecting static electricity in the atmosphere. Perhaps this allows rainforest ants to prepare for an impending thunderstorm. Sadly, though, ants, like any superhero, have to face their super-villains. One such villain is a nematode which can be ingested by an ant which consumes bird feces, and the nematodes, one female and another male, enter the ant’s abdomen. After mating, the male nematode dies, followed by the female, who develops a large clutch of eggs. Somehow, these nematodes manipulate the ant’s body so that they may feed off of it and cause the ant’s abdomen to grow larger and red (instead of the usual black color), like a berry, attracting a bird to pluck off the ant’s abdomen and begin the life cycle of the nematode once more.


Many of Dr. Yanoviak’s findings have been unprecedented, and he is pleased to continue his research with help from many engineers, chemists, physicists, fellow biologists, and financial supporters. He’s happy to share his research with students and applies his practical knowledge to teaching ecological science. The experience was really enlightening and extremely interesting, keeping the students on the edge of their seats while they got brain freezes on ice cream!

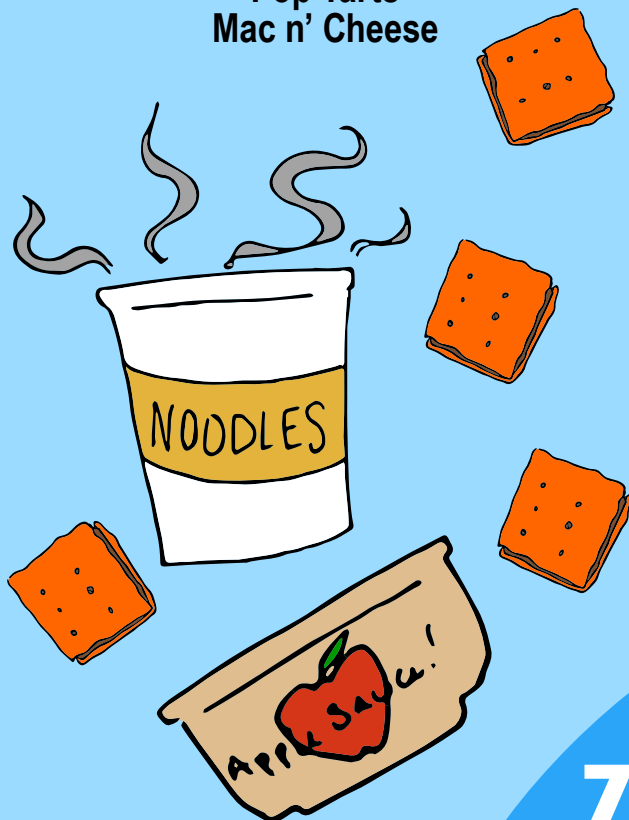

POSITIVE PEACE PANEL

Members of the UofL community gathered on September 21, 2016, at 1:00 PM to attend a Positive Peace TedTalk in the Chao Auditorium of Ekstrom Library. Honors Student Council and The Peace, Justice, and Conflict Transformation Program co-sponsored a panel and open dialogue where attendees were informed about positive peace through a TedTalk and then given the floor to discuss how to implement this concept in their community. The central theme of the discussion was differentiating between negative peace and positive peace.

Panelists defined “negative peace” as conflict resolution, such as through violence, which only solves the problem momentarily, while “positive peace” means strategizing how to prevent the conflict from returning in the future. After the death of yet another unarmed African-American male, Terence Clutcher, one question by Breanna Martin felt strikingly relevant: after positive peace options have been exhausted, when is enough, enough? Noah Smith, another participant in the discussion, seemed to relate to Breanna’s frustration. Referencing the New York Stonewall riots for LGBT rights, he quoted Martin Luther King, Jr. in the discussion, stating “riots are the [language] of the unheard.”

After being served a healthy array of discussion around social justice issues like animal rights, environmental rights, fair pay, and gender equality, attendees seemed satisfied by an increased understanding of what peace can actually mean. George Kushner, senior, expressed an affinity for open dialogues such as these, and told The Current he gained “more perspective.” Psychological and Brain Sciences faculty member, Dr. Lora Haynes, commented, “I love the idea of thinking through conflict and conveying different kinds of peace.” While peace seems like a simple concept, finding ways to promote it in our daily lives is more of a challenge. Through this event participants gained a deeper understanding of the complexities of peace as a concept and practice.

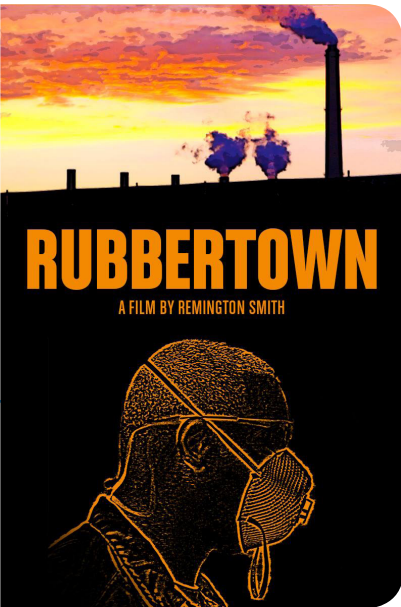

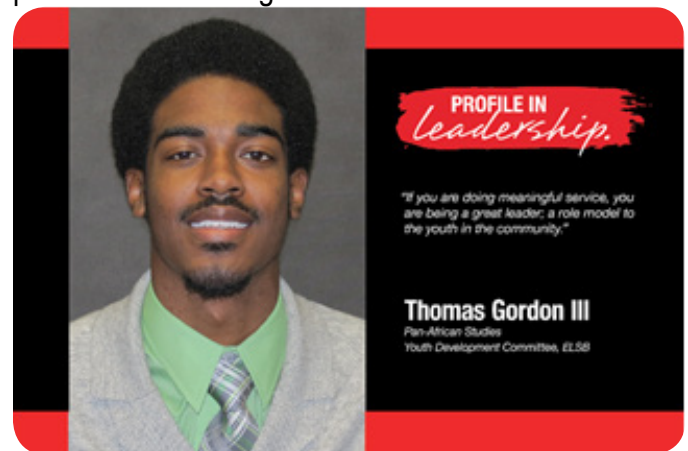
