

Why is the opposing pet inferior to your chosen fuzzball?







Although this message may seem a bit premature since international departure is not until May 2018, preplanning is critical. If you are interested in this opportunity and if you haven't already completed the prerequisites, please plan to register for and complete them during the upcoming fall 2017 semester and spring 2018 semester or Faculty Director approval before the 2018 departure. Based on the pedagogical model of learning-through-doing, 8-12 students will gain practical service-learning/research experience working directly with on a faculty member's on-going research project.

DETAILS:

- 1. Application is open to all majors. Participation preference will be given to Psychology majors and minors.
- Prerequisites include: Cumulative and Major GPA of 3.0, PSYC201, PSYC301 (or approved/equivalent department statistics course), and PSYC302 (or approved/equivalent department research methods course) or Faculty Director approval. These prerequisite courses must be completed prior to our international departure in May 2018.
- 3. An informal interview with the Faculty Director is required prior to selection in September 2017.
- Those selected will be required to complete PSYC404: Intergroup Contact & Conflict Resolution (1- credit hour) during the spring 2018 semester.
- 5. Selected students must register and will earn 6 credit hours for PSYC408 (2018 Spring Term with international departure in May. NOTE: Grades will not be posted until after return to USA.) Although the cost of tuition will be waived and class registration is required, a program fee associated with instruction and travel will apply. Payment will be processed through the Registrar's Office (3-4 installments).
- 6. The early selection process will allow you time to begin saving for the trip.
