I appreciate being considered to share my journey with your student body. I am a proud alumni of the University of Louisville's Criminal Justice program.

Following my honorable discharge from the United States Navy, I attended the University of Louisville from the 1998 to 2002. On May 11, 2002, I obtained a B.S. degree in Justice Administration. While attending, I was a member of the Omicron chapter of the Alpha Phi Sigma criminal justice honor society.

I embarked on a career with the Kentucky Department of Corrections as a Probation & Parole Office in August of 2002. I had the opportunity to supervise a diverse selection of caseloads, including a specialized domestic violence offender caseload, as well as Felony supervision officer. I have had the opportunity of being promoted to supervisory positions covering districts located in Fayette and Jefferson counties.

In 2013, I was promoted to a Branch Manager for the Easter Region of Kentucky, covering the Eastern Kentucky. The rural challenges of Appalachia really opened my eyes to make the necessary adjustments to provide resources that cater to the region, vice using a one-size-fits-all approach to management

In a couple of months, I will achieve my 19th year work anniversary. Currently, as a Probation & Parole Regional manager, my job is to provide my region with resources to effect change in the lives of the justice-involved individuals we supervise. I have witnessed my agency change from an adversarial model, to an evidence-based model, which provides our population with resources to be successful on supervision, and have positive outcomes in their journey to reintegrate back into society.

Over the course of my career I have had the opportunity of assisting Dr. Elizabeth Grossi by being a guest speaker on community corrections in Kentucky. As a proud alumni of the University of Louisville, I often provide many opportunities for students to complete a student internship, or volunteer to assist our population.

Cara Graf, Alexis Miller, Erin Robinson-MSCJ Studen



CJ students Alexis Miller, Erin Robinson, Cara Graf participated in the University of Louisville Engaged Scholarship Symposium 2021 presenting "A Distant Mirror: Human Rights, Breonna Taylor and the Perspectives of Law Students in the Russian Federation" on March 12<sup>th</sup>.

"Our presentation looked at five major areas of policing that have been, or should be, restructured to promote safer and more fair enforcement of laws. We dove into the cases that catalyzed the creation of each change; historical successes, failures, and struggles related to implementing these reforms; and the hoped-for impact of all five practices becoming standard at every police department. In our discussion, we analyzed, specifically, the recent Louisville, Kentucky case of Breonna Taylor, which has sparked a revolution in policing around the country and a fight against neo-racism around the world. The five topics of police issues relative to Breonna Taylor that we covered were Rehabilitation versus Incarceration, Requirements for Search Warrants, Police Use of Body Cameras, and Training/Use of Force. Initially, we presented to students at Perm State University in Perm, Russia. We feel that with the Russian students as well as the UofL symposium, we sparked important conversations regarding police conduct and accountability on both a local and international level." - CJ students Alexis Miller, Erin Robinson, and Cara Graf
