ANTH 347-01: Global Capitalism

The course adopts an interdisciplinary approach to explore how capitalism is organized, practiced or resisted. It seeks to understand capitalism as historically situated and culturally-informed practices in different world regions.

ENGL 369: Minority Traditions in Latin America (AHD1)

This course examines the works of authors from underrepresented groups, including African, LatinX,– Native American Literature Asian,/Pacific Islander, and/or Native American populations in the United States. We will analyze literary texts in relation to social factors such as class, ace, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, religion, disability, and/or indigeneity.

ENGL 373: Women and Global Literature (AHD2)

HUM 377-50: African-American Religion (AHD1)

This course explores various religious beliefs, practices, experiences, traditions and institutions of African descended people in the United States. Students will be introduced to a range of African- American religious traditions and a variety of perspectives within African- American religious thought. These traditions and their respective beliefs and practices will be situated within their proper historical, social and cultural contexts.

Study of the international legal system; with emphasis on the principles of international law and activities of the United Nations and other international organizations encountered by the practicing lawyer. May be offered as a seminar.

LAW 961-01: Immigration Law Externship**Trucios-Haynes, E. Off Campus**

Students will be assigned to cases under the supervision of a practicing immigration law attorney and a member of the Brandies School of Law faculty. Students will participate in immigration matters relating to refugees such as lawful permanent resident petitions, citizenship petitions, and applications for employment authorization, as well as immigration matters for other noncitizens including all aspects of deportation defense and applications for asylum. Students may have an opportunity to represent clients before an immigration adjudication officer or before an immigration judge. Students must be certified under the Student Practice Rules of the Kentucky Supreme Court.
