In one case, adult identical twins underwent a first-of-its-kind, fat-grafting procedure at University of Louisville Hospital, a part of KentuckyOne Health that used fat from one twin to restore the other twin's appearance following a bout of childhood cancer. In the other, a team of UofL physicians at Kosair Children's Hospital separated 7-week-old twin girls conjoined at the chest and abdominal cavity.
