Why Mentoring Matters

Mentoring programs cultivate and enrich staff through personal and professional development. Mentoring programs give staff direction in how to reach their career goals. These programs provide networking opportunities that otherwise may not be available.

Mentoring programs benefit the workplace by:

- Enhancing employee morale
- Providing leadership development
- Sharing of institutional knowledge



What is a Mentor?

A mentor is someone that uses their experiences and knowledge to guide and nurture less experienced individuals. Mentors develop a relationship with the mentees to foster learning and to encourage professional development.

The roles of mentors may vary depending on the needs of the mentee. The relationship formed between the mentor and mentee may also determine the direction of the mentorship. Mentors may become one or many things to the mentee such as:

- Teacher
- Advisor
- Motivator
- Coach
- Role model
