Robley Rex Veterans Administration Medical Center Geriatrics & Extended Care Service

Our mission is "To provide our veterans and caregivers support to sustain their independence and quality of life."



The Geriatrics & Extended Care Service (GEC) brings together a diverse group of professionals dedicated to the care of older and/or special needs Veterans. Together, we address the acute, chronic, and preventive care needs of individuals that often have complex medical issues. This care takes place in both inpatient and outpatient via Home Based Primary Care (HBPC), hospice, residential care, and private home care.

The Home Based Primary Care (HBPC) is a special program that provides primary health care in the home. The program is focused on care for disabled, chronically ill patients who have difficulty accessing medical care in a clinic or hospital setting. The multidisciplinary team includes geriatricians, nurse practitioners, registered nurses, wound care specialty nurses, physical and occuThepational therapists, dieticians, pharmacists, psychologists and social workers.

The Medical Foster Home Program allows the Veteran to reside in the community within a designated caregiver's home. The Medical Foster Home Program is in addition to HBPC.

Geriatric Specialty Clinics

The Cognitive Clinic is focused on Veterans with known or suspected cognitive impairment. This is a team evaluation involving a geriatrician, social worker and psychologist with objective of identifying dementia type and assisting with care.

The Falls Clinic is focused on evaluation of the Veteran with frequent falls. The patient's team evaluation involves a geriatrician and physical and occupational therapists with the objective of looking at factors contributing to the Veteran's falls and ways of decreasing fall risk.

The Geriatric Primary Clinic (coming soon) will be a multidisciplinary clinic involving a geriatrician, social worker, pharmacist, and psychologist to provide primary care for elderly Veterans with multiple geriatric issues.

Hospice and Palliative Care

The Multidisciplinary Palliative Care Team focuses on relief of suffering and providing the best possible quality of life for people facing pain, stress and other symptoms of serious illness. It is appropriate at any age and any stage of an illness and can be provided along with treatments meant to cure. Patients can be seen in consultation in the hospital or in Palliative Care Clinic. The VA also has a 6-bed inpatient hospice unit for patients nearing the end of their life due to illness. Since cure is not possible, the goal is reducing pain and optimizing comfort and quality of life in a home-like setting.

Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program

The Homemaker/Home Health Aide Program permits the VA to pay for homemaker and home health aide assistance for eligible Veterans who otherwise would require care in a nursing home. Services include assistance with bathing, dressing eating, toileting, and mobility. Other services may include help with exercises, using medical equipment and health monitoring. In rare cases, specific household tasks such as light housekeeping or shopping may be provided.
