Douglas S. Hawkins, M.D.

Professor of Pediatrics Hematology/Oncology Division University of Washington School of Medicine Seattle, Washington

Douglas S. Hawkins, M.D., is chair of the Children's Oncology Group (COG). COG is the world's largest organization devoted exclusively to childhood and adolescent cancer research. It unites over 10,000 childhood cancer specialists at more than 200 leading children's hospitals, universities and cancer centers across North America, Australia and New Zealand in the fight against childhood cancer. Dr. Hawkins also is a clinician at Seattle Children's Hospital and a professor of pediatrics at the University of Washington School of Medicine in Seattle.

Previously, Dr. Hawkins was the chair of the COG Soft Tissue Sarcoma Committee, overseeing biology studies and clinical trials for rhabdomyosarcoma and other soft tissue sarcomas across North America. Dr. Hawkins also was a member of the COG Bone Tumor Steering Committee. His academic career has focused on clinical research, particularly in the treatment of pediatric sarcomas. He was the chair of two COG clinical trials, one for Ewing sarcoma and another for rhabdomyosarcoma. He chairs the international Euro Ewing Consortium External Advisory Board and Data Monitoring Committee for the international FaR-RMS Study for children and adults with frontline and relapsed rhabdomyosarcoma.
