### POINTS OF PRIDE



UofL School of Nursing and several other Kentucky universities, in collaboration with the Kentucky Department of Agriculture and other partners, provided free health screenings during the National Farm Machinery Show at the Kentucky Exposition Center. The group was led by assistant Professor Dr. Cheryl Witt, who has been working diligently to bring attention to the mental health crisis among farmers in Kentucky. She is also the project director for the grant-funded initiative Raising Hope KY, which is designed to provide farmers access to resources through research, prevention, intervention and community education. Over spring break, our Owensboro Extension completed their **Community Engagement Experience**, an activity in which faculty, staff and students volunteer their time to support several local organizations. This year, the group prepared and served meals at a homeless shelter, volunteered time helping to organize at a men's drug and alcohol recovery shelter, organized donations for refugees from Iran with the Owensboro International Center, and conducted a drive for items needed at an emergency women and children's shelter.



The Kentucky Board of Nursing approved a request to increase the enrollment for both of our campuses. The baseline enrollment increased to 100 students per year in Owensboro and 300 students per year in Louisville.

# **CLINICAL NURSE LEADER GRADUATING CLASS**

In May, the inaugural cohort of the Clinical Nurse Leader is graduating from our Master's Entry into Professional Nursing (MEPN) Clinical Nurse Leader (CNL) program. Graduates of this unique two-year, or six semesters program, receive a Bachelor of Science in Nursing and a Master of Science in Nursing. Upon graduation, the direct-entry master's students will be eligible to sit for National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX-RN) for registered nursing licensure and the Clinical Nurse Leader Certification Examination offered by the AACN Commission on Nurse Certification. The CNL applies evidence-based practice to assure that cutting edge advances in care are in action and are positively influencing patient outcomes. Responsibilities include: developing patients' care plans, and leading healthcare teams, managing processes, using data to create and implement evidence-based practice, and addressing challenges experienced by patients and colleagues during the caregiving process. # **DID YOU KNOW?**



In 1954, the first Black students were admitted to the program. Lillian Foxall, Latach Scott and Flora Ponder were admitted in to the program (known as General Hospital's School of Nursing at the time). Mayor Broaddus had pledged in his campaign for office that Black women were allowed to take nurse training at General. Men were prohibited from enrolling until 1964. The women were also allowed to live in the student nuses home. Flora recalls being asked by local Black leaders to apply because she attended nursing school in Hanover, Indiana but didn't complete her studies. The leaders were concerned that the school would try to reject Black students as unqualified, but they figured it would be difficult to find Flora unqualified given her background.
