Each year, the Grawemeyer foundation at UofL awards \$200,000 each to the winners in five categories, including music. Established in 1984 by the late UofL alumnus Charles Grawemeyer, the awards are the first major international prizes to honor powerful ideas in the arts and sciences rather than personal achievement.

A team from UofL and Kleinert, Kutz and Associates Hand Care Center proved hand transplants were possible by performing the nation's first successful procedure in 1999. They just completed their third. Two other UofL surgeons, Laman Gray and Robert Dowling, performed the world's first two successful AbioCor fully implantable replacement heart implants. Both the hand and heart teams conducted their procedures at Jewish Hospital.

NIH Funding Soars

UofL's NIH funding growth is the fastest in the nation among research universities, reflecting both the quality and quantity of studies being conducted here. UofL is transferring the results of its research into commercial enterprise. Eighteen business startups are a direct result of this

research to date.
