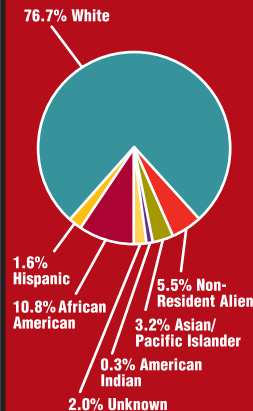

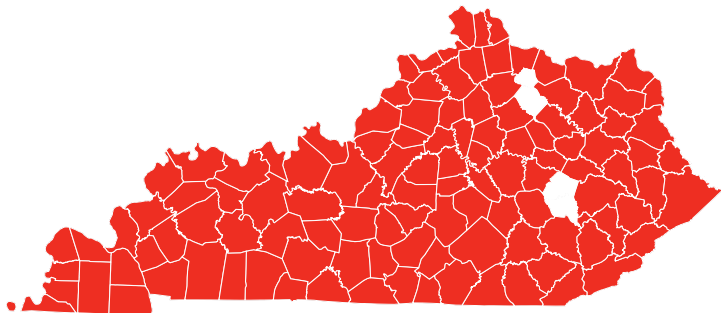

UofL has raised its admissions standards three times over the past seven years to emphasize the quality of student we attract. Our 2007 entering freshman class had an average ACT score of 24.3—the national average was 21.2.

TOP RANKED

UofL has more than 30 nationally recognized programs. *U.S. News & World Report* rankings listed the College of Business in the top 7 percent of all business schools in the country for 2006, 2007 and 2008. And the College of Education and Human Development's graduate education program was in the top 25 percent of all such programs for 2008.

GRADUATING MORE

In 2007 UofL graduated its largest December class ever—nearly 1,400 students. Even more noteworthy, UofL's graduation rate is rising faster than any of Kentucky's eight public universities—a jump of 7.4 percent increase between 2004 and 2006. One out of every four college graduates in Jefferson County, Ky., earned a degree at UofL.

In January 2008 UofL revealed its next blueprint for success through the year 2020. The business plan focuses on five areas critical to UofL becoming a top 20 metropolitan research university: educational excellence; research, scholarship and creative activity; community partnerships; diversity, opportunity and social justice; and creative and responsive stewardship.

RESEARCH FUNDING SOARS

UofL's NIH funding growth is the fastest in the nation among research universities, reflecting both the quality and quantity of studies being conducted here. Total annual research funding has grown from \$28.9 million in 1999 to \$101 million in 2007. Federal research funding increased from \$15 million in 1999 to \$67.2 million in 2007

CARDINAL COVENANT

In fall 2007 UofL implemented Cardinal Covenant to assist students living at or below 150 percent of the federal poverty level. Eligible students receive funds to help pay for the cost of a UofL education. During the 2007-08 academic year, 169 students participated. UofL was the first college in Kentucky to implement such a program.

FOCUSED ON DIVERSITY

In 2007 more than 3,400 of UoL's 21,689 students were students of color. UofL had nearly 1,200 international students from 109 countries. In addition, each campus unit has a concrete diversity plan, and an annual \$10,000 award recognizes the unit that makes the most progress in the area of diversity.

FINDING ANSWERS TO CANCER

Scientists at UofL's James Graham Brown Cancer Center have more than 15 new cancer drugs under development—making it one of the top five centers for cancer drug development in the country. In 2007 Kosair Charities announced a \$12.5 million gift to create a children's cancer research program at the Brown Cancer Center.
