Record Enrollment

The University of Louisville's first-year enrollment for the fall 2022 semester (2,931), an increase of 9% over last year. Led by increases in the numbers of Black and Latino/ Hispanic students, as well as students from outside Kentucky, UofL welcomed more first-year Cardinals for the fall 2022 semester since fall 2018. Black students total 16.3% of first-time. baccalaureate degree-seeking students, up from 14.0% last year, while Latino/Hispanic students total 8.5% of that group, up from 7% last year.

Worthwhile Investment

The University of Louisville is creating a new campus in downtown Louisville to be known as the UofL Christina Lee Brown Envirome Institute – New Vision of Health Campus, where study will focus on health as a shared community resource, incorporating environmental and cultural factors. The campus will be both a world-class research center and a nexus for community engagement, spawning citizen scientists and making health equity everyone's pursuit. The launch of the New Vision of Health Campus is made possible by a commitment from health advocate Christina Lee Brown of Louisville valued at \$47 million – the largest-ever donation received by the university. Brown is providing \$30 million over 20 years to support the institute and is giving rent-free use of the buildings to the university, equating to a \$17 million in-kind donation.

Setting High Standards

- The Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education once more has designated UofL a "Research 1" doctoral university with very high research activity. UofL is one of only 146 universities- roughly 4% of those considered – to receive this designation.
- INSIGHT Into Diversity magazine again recognized UofL for its outstanding efforts toward diversity and inclusion, making 2022 the ninth consecutive year the university has received the national publication's Higher Education Excellence in Diversity (HEED) Award, and the fourth year the UofL Health Sciences Center has earned the Health Professions HEED Award. This also marks the third year the Cardinals have been selected as Diversity Champions, a distinction given to institutions scoring in the top tier of all HEED Award winners – only 15 were named this year.
- The University of Louisville's "Here & Beyond" brand campaign received multiple awards in the 10th annual Education Digital Marketing Awards, which "recognizes the best educational websites, digital content, electronic communications, mobile media and social media."

Strong Financial Position

The University of Louisville's 2022-23 fiscal year kicked off with a mathematically and strategically balanced budget. At \$1.5 billion. the FY 2022-23 budget is the largest in the university's history. Among the budget's many highlights are a 0.0% tuition increase for undergraduate students and the development of a new Cardinal Commitment financial aid program that will supplement other forms of financial aid to help ensure full cost of tuition for resident Pelleligible students. Employees received a 2.5% cost-of-living increase, and minimum starting wages for hourly employees increased to \$14.75.

Latest data provided by UofL's Office of Institutional Research and Planning indicates that the university has reached a six-year graduation rate of 62.2%, which is the highest rate the University of Louisville has ever realized The six-year graduation rate for underrepresented minorities is 57.2% (up 3.4% over 2021): underprepared students is 45.6% (up 0.6 of a percent over 2021); and underfunded students is 52.6% (up 1.9% over 2021).
