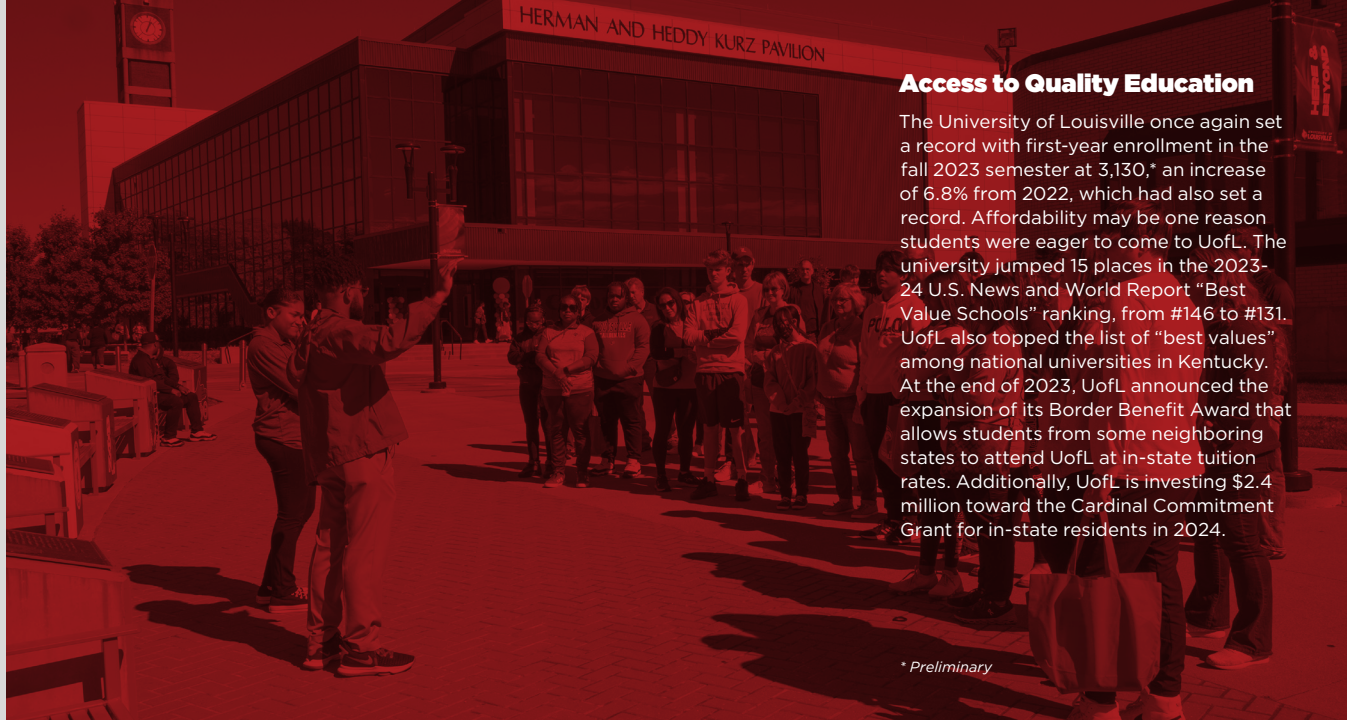

Access to Quality Education

The University of Louisville once again set a record with first-year enrollment in the fall 2023 semester at 3,130,* an increase of 6.8% from 2022, which had also set a record. Affordability may be one reason students were eager to come to UofL. The university jumped 15 places in the 2023-24 U.S. News and World Report "Best Value Schools" ranking, from #146 to #131. UofL also topped the list of "best values" among national universities in Kentucky. At the end of 2023, UofL announced the expansion of its Border Benefit Award that allows students from some neighboring states to attend UofL at in-state tuition rates. Additionally, UofL is investing \$2.4 million toward the Cardinal Commitment Grant for in-state residents in 2024.

Research and Innovation Impact

Research and Innovation continued to soar to new heights in 2023, with UofL research expenditures totaling a record \$230 million.

- More than \$22 million in funding from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) was awarded to the Schools of Medicine (\$16 million) and Nursing (\$6.5 million) for physician and nurse training to help increase Kentuckians' access to health care, particularly in underserved rural and urban areas.
- An \$11.5 million grant from the National Institutes of Health was announced for UofL researcher Cheri Levinson to continue her work addressing the devastating effects of eating disorders.
- Research conducted in UofL's Micro/Nano Technology Center is investigating whether the antibacterial properties of cicada wings can be turned into an antimicrobial for use in places like food service, health care facilities and medical devices.
- More than 80 of UofL's top researchers, scholars and artists were honored in October at the 2023 Research, Scholarship and Creative Activity Awards ceremony.



Student Scholars

University of Louisville students expand their horizons, from prestigious scholars sharing their academic talents abroad to student musicians taking their musical talents underground for a one-of-a-kind concert located in the depths of Mammoth Cave. Scholars from UofL have earned some of the most prominent awards in academia. UofL is home to:

- Kentucky's only Truman Scholar
- One of only two Kentucky students to win a Voyager Scholarship
- Kentucky's only Quad Fellow
- Two Goldwater Scholars
- Six Fullbright Scholars

Since 2003, UofL has had more than 160 Fullbright scholars, more than all other four-year, Kentucky public institutions combined.

Robust Budget

Tied to University of Louisville's strategic plan, the FY 2023-24 budget is \$1.65 billion — the largest operating budget in the university's history. It includes several key initiatives that support students, faculty and staff while ensuring the university's financial stability, protecting its assets and preparing for future growth. Among the budget's many highlights are:

- \$3.5 million in institutional financial aid to support affordability for students and their families;
- \$600,000 increase to the graduate stipend pool to help attract and retain outstanding students;
- 2% cost of living (COLA) increase for eligible regular full-time and part-time faculty and staff;
- \$77 million in state support for asset preservation.

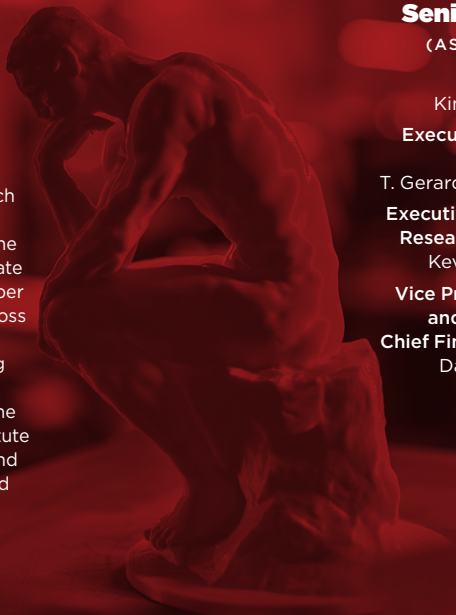

Economic Engine

The University of Louisville continues to serve as a force in manufacturing for the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The U.S. Department of Commerce awarded the university \$13 million to launch the Kentucky Manufacturing Extension Project (KEMP). The project is expected to generate \$150 million to \$200 million per year in economic growth across Kentucky. The partnership will work closely with existing UofL manufacturing-related research centers, including the Additive Manufacturing Institute of Science and technology and the Louisville Automation and Robotics Research Institute.
