## **Research and Innovation Impact**

Research and innovation continued to soar to new heights in 2024, with UofL research expenditures totaling an impressive \$220 million

- The university secured \$24 million to train the next generation
  of clinical researchers and drive work that can save and
  improve lives. The funding, which includes \$11.7 million from the
  National Institutes of Health matched dollar for dollar by UofL,
  marks the single largest investment in clinical research in the
  university's history.
- Competitive funding including grants, contracts and clinical trial agreements totaled \$188 million - a nearly 7% increase over the previous year.
- 70 new patents were awarded with the potential to save lives, helping the university reach \$792 thousand in total innovation income, including patent royalties and licensing.
- The Green Heart Project found that people living in Louisville neighborhoods where trees and shrubs were doubled showed lower risk indicators for heart disease and other chronic diseases.



## **Student Scholars**

UofL students expand their horizons and exceed expectation, from prestigious scholars sharing their academic talents abroad to a student making history as the first to receive a highly selective honor that will send her to New York City for two years. Among so much more, UofL is home to:

- UofLs first FAO Schwarz Fellowship recipient
- Four U.S. Department of State Critical Language Scholars
- Three Boren Scholars
- Seven Fulbright Scholars

Since 2003, UofL has produced 175 Fulbright Scholars, more than all other four-year Kentucky public institutions combined.

## **Robust Budget**

UofL's \$1.72 billion budget for fiscal year 2025 (FY 25) invests heavily in student success, retention and wellbeing; faculty and staff recruitment and retention; and the university's renowned research enterprise.

Among the highlights of the budget is a \$4.1 million investment in research computing to expand productivity and external funding.

To help mitigate rising tuition costs, scholarship support was increased by \$5.7 million for a total scholarship pool of nearly \$78 million.

Employee compensation remains a priority for FY 25 with an investment of \$17.8 million to increase salaries and wages.

Additionally, the state is making significant investments in UofL. FY 25 state appropriations to UofL total nearly \$180 million.

## **Economic Engine**

The University of Louisville continues to serve as a force for economic impact in our communities. The commonwealth of Kentucky invested more than \$450 million in UofL, including a \$280 million investment to build the new Health Sciences Simulation Center and Collaboration Hub the largest amount of funding for a single project in UofLs history. Other investments include \$10.6 million over two vears to continue supporting the Kentucky Manufacturing Extension Partnership, which is expected to generate \$150 million to \$200 million per vear in economic growth for Kentucky.
